FROM THE PRESIDENT

The summer months are now behind us, however there are still many activities to come.

Patrols commenced in December with our members performing some life-preserving rescues on the first weekend. It is very disappointing to see the number of drownings in Victoria over the past few months, however, it highlights the important work that surf life saving clubs do. We must train our members and the community about water safety skills, first aid and performing CPR, whilst ensuring that there is adequate supervision and that people understand their current swimming ability.

The traditional bronze camp was delivered in a new innovative format, based back at the club for the first time in over a decade and with a more manageable number of just over 50 new and existing members completing their bronze. Well done also to our new Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) holders under the training of Ingilby Dickson, Derek Stott and Noel Langford.

The 2018 Burson Rock2Ramp Ocean Swim was conducted in near perfect conditions. This major club fundraiser was a tremendous success (\$43,000 raised) with a record 1024 swimmers participating and bolstering tourism to the area.

Thank you to Fiona Fitzgerald and Rob O'Brien for delivering another very successful Nipper program with over 400 nippers involved.

In January the club hosted the annual Anglesea Senior Carnival, attracting over 670 competitors including 53 from Anglesea. A number of awards were presented including: Honorary Membership to ASLSC Patron Anne Ramsden; 60-year Long Service Award to ASLSC Life Member and Patron Garry Johnson; 2017/18 Special Achievement Award – for services to Polar Bears, Michael McConnell; and the 2017/18 Bruce Edmonds Award – for outstanding contribution to the Nipper program, to Jono Clarke.

Congratulations to three of our Surf Sports members, John Fitzgerald (Youth Team), Marli Wilkinson (Senior Team) and Saxon Beale (Senior Team) who were selected to represent the state at Newport SLSC, NSW in mid-January.

The club farewelled Tanya Devine, who for over 8 months was a significant contributor as our Fundraising, Partnerships & Communications Officer. We have now appointed existing club member Jennifer McIntyre to the new role of Marketing & Events Officer.

What's next? We are still planning more events after this. For now, though:

- How about jumping on patrol to ensure that our beaches remain safe;
- Have you thought about becoming a trainer?
- If you are aged 18-35 years old how about our Saturday sessions at Captain Moonlite;
- Heading up to Broadbeach, QLD to support Anglesea at the Australian Surf Life Saving Championships;
- Have a meal or drink at Captain Moonlite;
- Come along to our Demolition party on Easter Sunday April 22nd as we farewell our old clubhouse in style
- Have a go in the Ding Alley Pro, on again at Easter.

NEW CLUBHOUSE BECOMES A REALITY @ ASLSC!

The Hon Sarah Henderson MP, Assistant Minister for Social Services, Housing and Disability Services, and Member for Corangamite has announced Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club (ASLSC) will receive a \$1 million dollar grant from the Building Better Regions Fund.

Tom Cullen, ASLSC President thanked Ms Henderson and the Federal Coalition Government for their support saying, "after ten years of planning, these funds will ensure the clubs outdated and deteriorating 50-year old facilities will be transformed into a state-of-the-art Surf Life Saving, Training and Community Hub".

Announcing the grant, Ms Henderson spoke of the important work that ASLSC members do in the community patrolling and keeping our beaches safe, educating children in surf skills and awareness and growing future lifesavers. The new building will improve the operational capability of the ASLSC and also increase opportunities to utilise the building as a community facility.

This grant from the Building Better Regions Fund takes funds raised to \$4.8 million dollars and minimises the need for ASLSC and its

members to be burdened with long term debt for the construction.

ASLSC will now move to finalise a tender and issue a contract for construction and fit out of the redevelopment while continuing to raise funds to fit the new facility out.

It is important to note the significant work that has been completed by numerous members over many years.

Building Redevelopment UPDATE



Ready, set, go!

We have finally reached the start line after years of planning; now we need to make preparations for the redevelopment to begin.

Prior to any works commencing, the office, along with shop stock and some rescue gear, will be relocated to the gym. As some works will need to be carried out in the gym to allow this to happen the gym will be closing some time after the end of February. We also need to construct a doorway into the female bunkrooms from the store area under the Ray Marsh Room deck. Both bunkrooms will be out of service during the redevelopment.

In due course all other rescue, training and nipper equipment will be relocated to our off-site storage facility in the Anglesea industrial estate. If you are storing personal craft such as skis or boards at the club, we ask that you collect these and store elsewhere as we will be unable to store these for you during the redevelopment.

Once we have a better handle on a start date and the construction program, the relevant directors will provide advice on how their areas will operate throughout the 2019-2020 season. However, it is clear that there will be major adjustments in how we run patrols, member development programs and the Nipper program next season.

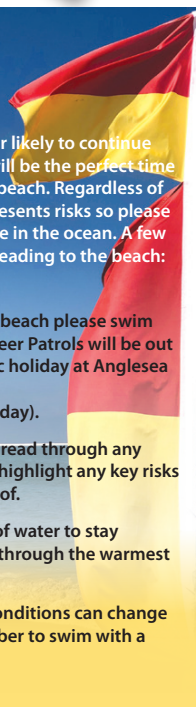
We are now at \$4.8M which will allow us to move to appointing a builder and commencing the construction in the coming months. The next challenge is fit out our new club house and cover the increased costs of the transition period, when we don't have a clubhouse. So if you have been hanging back, waiting to see if this project is real or just a dream, now is the time to commit and be recognised for your support.

Beach Safety

With the lovely warm weather likely to continue over the coming months, it will be the perfect time to head down and enjoy the beach. Regardless of the time of year the beach presents risks so please take care when spending time in the ocean. A few tips to remember if you are heading to the beach:

- 1 If you're swimming at the beach please swim between the flags. Volunteer Patrols will be out every weekend and public holiday at Anglesea Main Beach until 22 April 2019 (Easter Monday).
- 2 When entering the beach read through any safety signage which will highlight any key risks on the beach to be aware of.
- 3 Make sure you drink lots of water to stay hydrated and seek shade through the warmest parts of the day.
- 4 Don't forget that beach conditions can change quickly, so always remember to swim with a friend.





Ding Alley PRO II

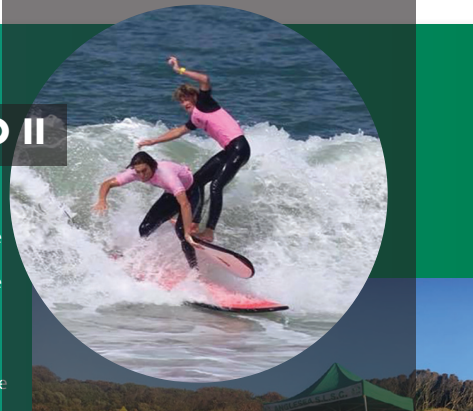

How Ding Alley got its name

In the 70's before the advent of leg rope on surfboards and when there was a lot more sand on Main Beach there was a good surfing break next to the rocks. It was unique because the longshore current on Main Beach ran from the middle of the beach towards the rocks, the rocks then redirected the current out to sea. This caused a rip and everyday day at high tide there was a really nice left hand breaking wave (a lefthander).

The problem was that the wave broke towards the rocks. Before leg ropes were invented you would often lose your board onto the rock and a hole in a surfboard is known as a ding, hence the name of the surf break became Ding Alley.

Over the years as the sand has steadily eroded off the beach it very infrequently breaks as it used to.
