President's Report

Welcome to the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club's 2019-20 Annual Report. Another lifesaving year has now been completed and this one has obviously been very different with the patrol and competition seasons finishing abruptly with the onset of the devastating COVID-19 pandemic. I will come back to the impacts of COVID-19 later in my report so we can now focus on everything else that has happened this past season.

If we put the pandemic aside, this year was unique in itself as we operated in the most part without a clubhouse. This significant change galvanised our Club Members and we were able to pivot well to deliver our programs and services to an equally successful level if not higher. Change is often a challenge, however the way we all adapted was a credit to all members.

The tireless work of our Club Captain Marli Wilkinson, has been fantastic. Marli's energy, ability to engage members and her leadership has delivered numerous initiatives and events including the Surf Coast Primary School Surf Lifesaving Carnival, Beach Party, Market Stalls and the ISO Winter Challenge to name just a few. Thank you also to Kate Owen for your outstanding support of Marli at many of these events.

Despite the challenges faced by our patrol teams towards the end of the season it was fantastic for Life Saving Victoria to award Anglesea SLSC as the Surf Coast 'Area Winner' and 'Most Improved' for our patrol service. External inspectors were impressed with our high level of patrol standards. Congratulations to all patrolling members, particularly our Patrol Captains and Anglesea Surf Rescue (ASR) teams.

From a fundraising perspective we had another successful year with our annual major fundraising events. The 2019 Bursons Rock2Ramp was conducted with record numbers. Thank you to Garry Johnson for your ongoing support and all those who contributed in raising \$38,415. Special mention to Jen McIntyre for your tireless work in the background. The 2020 DoorKnock was successfully conducted with just over \$30,000 raised. Thank you to Peter Williams and everyone who supported this important fundraiser.

The Nipper Program had another successful year under the leadership of Sam Hume and Matt Keenan. Well done to all Age Group Leaders, water safety officers and helpers for your efforts. It has been great to see the number of enthusiastic and (at times) fearless Dolphins hitting the beach for training and participating at carnivals this season, under the leadership of Ivor Morgan and his team.

Well done to Matt Taylor, Mike Martin and the rest of the Member Development team of trainers and assessors. Under Matt's leadership this area continues to go from strength to strength.

It was a pleasure to announce at the 2019/20 Anglesea Senior Carnival Luncheon new inductees to the Anglesea SLSC Surf Sports Hall of Fame. From a Surf Sports perspective, congratulations to Saxon Beale who was selected to represent Victoria at the SLSA Interstate Championships held in January.

Congratulations to Naantali Marshall awarded as the Masters Athlete of the Year and Jemima Fitzgerald awarded the Mike Martin AM Champion Junior Lifesaver at the annual Life Saving Victoria Awards of Excellence.

From a leadership development perspective, we are committed to investing in our current and future leaders and we have had a number of members be accepted and/or completed exciting leadership development opportunities. Rachael Gay and Freddie Graham completed the LSV Ready2Lead 2020 – Intermediate Female Leadership Program, Lachie Eaton attended the SLSA National Leadership College and Matthew Taylor has recently been selected to attend the

As we approach the end of over 10 years of dedication and commitment for the Club's building redevelopment project, you will all agree that the building that has almost been built (at the time of writing this report), is amazing and a once in a generation effort! Over the coming months as we prepare for summer, the Club has further work fitting out the building and moving in ahead of Members being able to utilise it.

Thank you and congratulations to Peter Williams who has done an outstanding job leading this project. Thank you also to the Building Redevelopment Committee and all other Members who have helped drive this project. Without the significant and generous support of Members, supporters and our partner organisations, contributing financially and/or in-kind, this project would not have been possible. We look forward to opening the doors to you all soon.

Thank you to Gemma and Matt and the entire team at Captain Moonlite for a wonderful 4 years and we wish you well for the future. With the advent of COVID-19 the hospitality industry is facing uncertain times ahead and this has impacted us all as we work through appointing a new catering partner. We all hope that the recovery can be quick for all, as the impacts of the pandemic ease. Thank you to the House Committee led by Chris Foley for your tireless work behind the scenes.

Over the course of the past 18 months the Club, with the support of the Geelong Consulting Group, have developed the 2025 Strategic Plan. Thank you to all Members who contributed to this important project to provide direction to the Club as we move forward.

The vision for our Club is for: ***'A flourishing Club Community; where people are well connected, give service, develop to their full potential, socialise and have fun, achieve physical and mental health, care for each other and improve the environment.'***

The behind the scenes work of our dedicated Club staff, led by our new General Manager Jen McIntyre, ably supported by Jaci Chin-Jewson, Jennie Mauderer, Grace Bath, Nick Sluggett and Rodney Craig has been greatly appreciated and lessened the load on a small group of dedicated volunteer Club leaders. The level of work required to be completed year on year is ever increasing and without a paid workforce it is not sustainable for the Club to operate in the same way. As we move into a new building in the near future this workforce will be even more critical and allow us to do more as a Club and generate new revenue streams to support what we do.

It is with sadness that two Life Members passed away in the past year. Barry Marsh joined the Club in 1959 obtaining his Qualifying Certificate and then Bronze in 1961. Barry held numerous committee positions and was awarded SLSA's 25-Year and 50-Year Service Awards.

Ian Smith gained his Bronze in 1961 and was a member of the incredibly strong Senior R&R team of the 1960's that was in the first group of inductees to the Anglesea SLSC Hall of Fame. They will both be missed, and our condolences go to both families.

Like every surf lifesaving year, we thank and bid farewell to some of our Club leaders. Thank you to Emily King our Patrol Coordinator who has done an outstanding job and this year introduced the first 'Pink Patrol'. I would also like to acknowledge outgoing Director Sai Dale for his contribution to the Club and the surf sports space.

As we move into a new year for Anglesea Surf Lifesaving Club, our future will be challenging. At the time of writing this report, what the year will look like and what programs and services we can deliver is unknown and very difficult to plan as a result of COVID-19. In the coming months we will continue to follow the Victorian Chief Health Officer's, the Department of Health & Human Services, Emergency Management Victoria and Life Saving Victoria directions. The health and safety of our members and guests is our highest priority.

It is likely that we will have to make changes to the way we operate programs and services and we know that you will support us to ensure that we, as a Club, can continue to operate safely in some capacity. We will continue to keep you informed about what is happening as often as things progress and we are able to put appropriate plans in place.

However, remember there are some exciting things to look forward to including a new clubhouse, a new catering partner and being in Anglesea at the beach!

I recently read an article in The Age newspaper (Saturday 8 August 2020) about club memberships within the AFL and how clubs were expecting COVID-19 to significantly impact on club membership numbers and club finances. However, despite the social and financial impacts to the community, many clubs have recorded record memberships and only 1% of club members nationally requesting refunds.

Whilst the offerings and emotional connections the community have with their AFL clubs cannot be completely compared with our Club, there are some important call outs. These include that members want to support their clubs and they want to feel part of their club's ongoing future.

We understand that some members may not be able to participate in the Club this year due to your individual circumstances. To make it a little easier we are introducing new payment plan options and a financial hardship policy, as we need your ongoing engagement and support!

As we move into a New Year, we need to remember our purpose: ***'To save lives and keep people safe on the beach'***. Thank you to all the Members, Social Pass holders, supporters, sponsors, partners and friends for helping us achieve this through our values of ***'Service, Participation and Inclusion'***.

Marketing

Richard is one of the region's leading accountants and business advisors and a Director of West Carr & Harvey who provide the Club with pro-bono book-keeping and accounting services. These services have been provided over many years, saving the Club thousands of dollars.

Administration

Our significant administration activities associated with running a not for profit organisation with over 1,500 members have continued to be managed dutifully and effectively by Derek Stott.

Facilities

Tim Bone continued in the role of Director of Facilities and has assisted with managing the transition of Club activities and operations without a clubhouse this year. Tim's local knowledge, practical skills, network of suppliers, service providers and his personal connection with the Anglesea community is invaluable.

House Committee

The activities of the Committee over the past year have focused on firstly clearly identifying the wide range of 'house' requirements that our Members and our guests are seeking, and then to define what potential additional catering offerings the new Clubhouse facilities could provide to better meet the broader needs of our potential customers.

While Captain Moonlite had created an extremely popular venue with a premium food and beverage offering for both our Members and visitors to our Club, it became apparent to

the Committee that we needed to broaden our catering and Member services offerings, while retaining a clearly popular premium offering.

The Clubhouse redevelopment that is under way will create new facilities to enable:

- A premium catering offering to be delivered in the Ray Marsh Room (RMR) given the significant investment we are making to build a fully equipped commercial kitchen facility and to meet the year-round demand.
- Our Members and their introduced guests a dedicated area for socialising and taking in the impressive new vistas over the Anglesea beach created by the design of the new John Worrell Room (JWR) and the large balcony area.
- Special functions, such as birthday celebrations, weddings and large family gatherings to be accommodated in the JWR while the RMR operates in parallel with a full dining service.
- A family friendly food and beverage offering to be provided in the JWR at targeted times of the year to encourage greater use of the Clubhouse by our key groups of Members including Nipper families.
- The opening of a kiosk facility on the ground level to serve hot and cold drinks, healthy food options and snacks. This was identified as a key addition to the Club's house offering and will provide a safe and readily accessible food option to parents and their children. The nearest current food option requires children having to cross the Great Ocean Road and venture down to the general store some hundreds of meters away.

We were very aware that the scope of the services we were seeking would be quite challenging for an operator. However, to compromise on the scope would have been a lost opportunity to meet the evolving needs of our Members and to fully utilize the new building's potential.

Once the scope was defined we commenced a public tendering process, as is required by our lease of Crown Land. We first sought expressions of interest and this process attracted over a dozen written responses, which on review we then invited a shortlist to submit formal tenders.



Our tender requirements were clear, the successful operator would need to be multi-skilled and demonstrate a capability to provide a premium experience in the RMR, to maintain the excellent standard that Captain Moonlite had delivered for our Members and their guests, while having the capability to also deliver a family friendly offering, a kiosk offering over the peak months, while servicing the social needs of our Members in the JWR and manage large catered events for special occasions.

An over-riding requirement was also the need to maintain control of the facilities and their operations and not to simply hand the 'keys' of our new facility to an operator who could then dictate to us on when and how we could use the building.

The tendering process was successful and we have entered into a collaborative and productive planning phase with a competent and experienced commercial catering operator who is very familiar with the Club's needs and culture.

Due to the expanded footprint of the buildings, we have sought a new liquor licence permit from the Surf Coast Shire, which due to the impact of COVID on the Shire's operations has been delayed, and this has held up the formal signing of the contract with the new operator, however our planning with them continues to progress effectively under a Heads of Agreement.

Once the liquor licence has been resolved and the contract signed, we will make formal announcements to the Members.

The Board would like to recognise and thank Captain Moonlite for their significant contribution to the Club over the four years that they created and operated a very successful café and restaurant offering in the Ray Marsh Room. We wish them every success in their next endeavor.

The House Committee's journey to date has moved from defining future food and beverage services for members and guests, reviewing catering providers to now preparing for the operation of the Clubhouse. To ensure we deliver a welcoming and inclusive Clubhouse with services that are relevant, we will be expanding the House Committee's representation with the addition of two female members representing youth/young adults and young families.

Vice President - Lifesaving

The Club has experienced its most difficult season since establishment in 1952. The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on Australia's surf lifesaving movement has been profound and brought many of the Club's lifesaving and competitive activities to a premature conclusion. The cancellation of the Victorian Seniors, Australian Masters and Seniors surf lifesaving championships was particularly disappointing for those members who trained hard for these events and were looking forward to competition at the National level.

At the same time, there were bright spots early in the season including a very successful Nippers program, improved patrol attendance and performance, and some great LSV interclub competition results. Unfortunately, much of this early success was curtailed with the onset of the coronavirus disease.

Before reporting on some of the positives from the season, I wish to acknowledge the passing, in December 2019, of one of the Club's iconic members. Barry 'Skunk' Marsh was a legendary figure at Anglesea SLSC. He was not only a great Club member, surfboat rower, sweep, Boat Captain and Life Member, he dedicated his life to the Club and was at the centre of many of the developments that underpinned its success. But perhaps most of all, he was a great bloke.

A special memorial service was held on the beach at the Anglesea surf carnival on January 5th with Clubs forming a guard of honour to recognise his contribution to surf lifesaving. This was a particularly moving occasion and reflected the great respect that many had for Barry, Jan, Margaret Pitcher and their families.



Club section leaders will report in more detail on their respective areas later in this Annual Report. However, I would like to highlight some of the successes, particularly during the early part of the season. Of course, logistically we were challenged with not having a Club house to support member activities. However, the sections adapted very well and were able to carry out their responsibilities and perform without too much disruption.

The Nippers program was particularly successful with around 500 participants in this year's program. Of course, these are the young people who will provide the foundation for the future success of the Club and it will be important to keep them, and their parents, involved. It was encouraging that Anglesea had 38 young competitors enter the Warrnambool State Titles in March prior to the COVID-19 shutdown. The team had many commendable performances including several individual, team winners and placegetters. It is of course, important to

recognise these great performances. However, we also need to remember that the key objective is to encourage participation and congratulate everyone who is prepared to 'have a go'. Sam Hume made a major contribution in setting up the programs, supported by Matt Keenan, Matt Taylor and others in the team.

In terms of our Youth Development program, the SRC course makes a particularly valuable contribution to the Club in preparing our younger members for their future roles as surf lifesavers. Special mention is made of the dedicated work and quality of training delivered by Ingilby Dickson, Derek Stott and their team who managed this program.

The role that the Dolphins squad plays in developing competition skills for Nippers while importantly, emphasising teamwork and relationship building, is also recognised. These are characteristics which are important pillars for our young members in achieving success in competition but also in helping develop life skills which will be invaluable in later life. Apart from his other leadership duties, Ivor Morgan was instrumental in delivering this program.

We recognise one of the most important groups in our Club, our Starfish Nippers. This program enables all young people in our community to be included and enjoy surf and beach activities. We need to acknowledge the great contribution of Matilda Cameron who took over leadership of this season's program and also to the parents involved in making it such a success. Of course, we must also thank Janet Jones and Naomi Symington for developing the Starfish Nippers program which is now recognised nationally and inter-nationally.

The future of our Club is dependent on how well we can attract and develop our younger members. This is a particular challenge for us and we need to acknowledge those who make a special effort to develop their surf lifesaving skills. Special congratulations are extended to Jemima Fitzgerald who LSV awarded this season's Mike Martin Champion Junior Lifesaver Award. This is truly an honour for our Club and well deserved by Jemima.

As a volunteer surf lifesaving Club, our responsibility and obligation to the community is to provide the best possible service we can to protect the public who visit and use the Anglesea beach. Patrolling is the reason surf lifesaving Clubs were established and this is our most important priority. However, it is also being challenged. Like many other volunteer-based organisations, it is becoming increasingly difficult to attract and retain members as volunteer lifesavers. We must focus on new approaches and messages to get more young people engaged.

Having said this, Elise Langford and all of our Rescue Services team did a remarkable job this season in undertaking their patrolling responsibilities, until beaches were closed down to the public. On a positive note there was greater participation in patrols this season and the integration of new Bronze qualified members and SRC members into more experienced patrol teams, paid dividends. This approach was designed to enable new and younger members to learn more about lifesaving skills 'on the job'. There was also more activity by patrols on the beach including more mobile patrolling and good examples of patrol training including mock rescues being conducted. The opportunity will also be pursued to bring some of our more experienced Club members to patrols

to introduce specific surf skills such as board paddling, wave knowledge and general surf awareness.

An important innovation this season was the first 'Pink Zinc Patrol' which focused on our female members contribution, not only in patrolling and competition, but also in many of the leadership roles within our Club. This was a very successful event which we hope will be expanded in future.

As is often the case, a core group of patrol members did the 'heavy lifting' in completing patrol hours. These will be recognised later in the Annual Report, but I would like to mention the contribution of one member whose performance was exceptional. Andrew Rechtman completed the highest number of patrols, in excess of 60 patrol hours, during the season. What is particularly notable is that 'Doc' committed to volunteer his services despite his professional role as a medical doctor and the fact that he travelled from north east Victoria to undertake his patrol responsibilities. We often hear from other active members about the difficulties in volunteering and patrolling, but Andrew's example should be a clear demonstration to others as to what can be achieved.

Competition continues to be a major challenge for us. Anglesea has traditionally been one of the best performing Clubs in Victorian and National surf lifesaving competition. Regrettably, numbers of competitors have fallen away dramatically over the past few years.

Our competition mainstay has been R&R where we continue to be a leading participant, with strong leadership and support from Warren Clarke and Sai Dale driving this. We continue to participate in some beach events, such as beach flags and the beach relay, plus achieving some good results in board and water-based events.

As I mentioned at last year's AGM, our success in surf lifesaving relies not only on effective patrolling but also on building surf skills and knowledge and these come with involvement in competition. Competition improves member's abilities to manage surf conditions and development of fitness programs which enhance and improve effectiveness as lifesavers. Patrolling and competition are not mutually exclusive. We need to promote and develop both, if Anglesea is again to become a leader in surf lifesaving. This starts with new members and prospective Bronze candidates understanding that the Club offers many opportunities for pathways into competition. This message will be reinforced at the start of the 2020/21 season.

Membership Development is the major challenge for the Club. While we have maintained overall member numbers, we are suffering a serious decline in active membership. Without more Active Members we cannot fulfil our obligations either in patrolling or in competition. Of our total membership of 1494 at the start of this season we have 110 Active 15-18 years members and 130 Active 18 years and over members. These are down 17% and 16% respectively on the previous season, which also had declined over previous seasons. Matt Taylor and his team did an excellent job in carrying out this season's training programs, particularly at the Bronze camp. Whilst numbers were down compared with earlier seasons, the general assessment was that the training that did take place was of a higher quality and resulted in more commitment to the Club's activities. The ongoing challenge we face is attracting and retaining new trainers to run these courses.

The Club had around 25 trainers qualified in 2017/18 but with only 1 obtaining a training qualification this season. Our IRB

awards are of particular concern given the reliance on this equipment for effective patrolling and competition. In 2018/19 we had 15 drivers and 24 crew achieve their awards, while this season we had only 3 crew and no drivers qualify. Again a few of our existing drivers and crew carried the load with some major individual commitments.

There is clearly a great need to attract new members into this activity which is an essential requirement for our lifesaving delivery. There are undoubtedly some issues with LSV's training and assessor qualification processes that need further consideration. However, the Club must also review its membership promotion strategies to encourage more young people to understand not only the obligations of being a surf lifesaver but importantly, the rewards from being an active Club member, including benefits from involvement in competition and particularly the camaraderie and fun which are gained from membership.

I should also take this opportunity to highlight to parents, particularly of Nippers and younger members, that there are also great opportunities for them to play a major role in membership development. Certainly their support for their children and young people is essential, but they can also become involved in any of the Club's activities, from participation in water safety, assisting with activities such as the DoorKnock, Rock2Ramp, Anglesea LSV Carnival Day, youth surf activities, social events – and in becoming qualified lifesavers in their own right with wider active involvement including competition.

The Masters surf lifesaving competition is open to both females and male members and many parents do actively compete in these events. So please think about how you might support the Club and also consider the possibility of more active involvement as just mentioned (and as one example, our Masters 260+ surfboat crew only retired this season. Crew members had an average age of over 72 – so age is no barrier... and no excuse!).

Finally, I would like acknowledge the important contribution of our Supporters Group which is an advisory committee of the Club providing invaluable financial support and mentoring to many of our members. The Group is a collection of members with extensive experience of surf lifesaving, competition, and the Anglesea Club more generally. The Supporters Group together with the 'Polar Bears' fellowship group, which meets monthly during the winter months, plays a major role in the Club's fellowship, and makes a major contribution to both our lifesaving and social activities. Their roles are recognised and are greatly appreciated.

The 2019/20 season will go down in history for many of the wrong reasons. However, whether it was volunteer firefighters responding to the disastrous bushfires in December, or the many health workers and others who have responded to the COVID-19 pandemic, the importance of volunteering to support our communities, including surf lifesaving, should never be underestimated.

Administration Report

This is my third season as the Director of Administration for the Club and about my tenth year as a SRC Trainer. This was a unique season and certainly one that will not be forgotten, primarily for so many great contributions by our members to make everything happen under challenging conditions, and of course watching the construction phase of our new Clubhouse and then the impact of the restrictions caused by the virus.

Firstly the many great parts:

- The construction of the new Clubhouse has been a highlight and the rapid progress has given a fantastic boost to the morale of everyone involved, from the numerous approval processes completed by the working group, the design teams' concepts turning into reality, the daily engagement with the builders by our Project leader Peter Williams, and the huge fund raising efforts, led by Ingilby Dickson, and the financial management plans developed by Richard Carr that have made it all possible. All Club members can be rightly proud of the efforts of the whole team involved in bringing this new building to life, led by our incredibly hard-working President, Tom Cullen.
- Our Anglesea Surf Rescue teams, led by Elise Langford and her dedicated support crew and Patrol Captains, supported by the Life Guard services, have once again provided a professional level of care to over 60,000 visitors to our beaches, with no major incidents during the season.
- The leadership and commitment of the Member and Youth Development Directors, Matthew Taylor and Sam Hume, capably supported by Matt Keenan, Fiona Fitzgerald and Ivor Morgan, have been instrumental in making the Nipper and Dolphin programs so successful over the summer and off peak seasons.
- The fantastic teamwork and the numerous volunteer's contribution in managing the Nipper and Starfish programs while not having the Clubhouse facilities was simply outstanding and reflects the strong positive culture of our members and their families.
- The Directors of the Club have worked very diligently and effectively together to provide detailed input into and to drive the development of our Strategic Plan for the future of the Club. This may seem to be a bit of a 'business' type task, however it has been vital in identifying the right pathways forward for the Club to work on and ones that will deliver meaningful benefits for our members, especially with member engagement and personal development and local community engagement. I encourage all members to review the summary of the Plan, which is on the Club's web site.

My routine admin support workload over the past 12 months has been significantly lightened with the addition of Jen McIntyre as our Marketing & Events Officer in January 2019, and Jen's subsequent appointment as our Club's General Manager in February 2020.

I would like to warmly thank and congratulate Jen on her contribution to enhancing the effectiveness of the Club's marketing, communications and funds raising efforts through numerous grant applications, and her ownership of the day

to day administration of the staff we employ, many thanks for making my role easier!!

The daily operations of the business of the Club continue to be very well managed by Jaci Chin-Jewson, our Admin Coordinator, and Jaci is very well supported over the peak season and during her vacation breaks by Jennie Mauderer our Admin Assistant. Jaci and Jennie now report to Jen McIntyre.

Their daily tasks include the important roles of greeting and answering Members and visitors' questions, helping with on-line renewals, answering phone calls and responding to emails. All of these activities need to be calmly managed, while helping parents find lost items or their lost children, and while directing maintenance contractors and suppliers to the right locations and checking that their jobs are completed. Clearly a multi-faceted role that requires, skill and patience from our team!!

Over the time leading up to the annual renewal period, the Admin team invested a significant effort in building systems to better support our members with their membership renewal process, and the feedback was certainly very positive confirming that the registration processes of membership on SurfGuard, was easier this past season.

We still recognize that the annual membership renewal process can be challenging and the five year renewal of a WWCC (Working with Children Check) can appear to be complex or time consuming. I encourage all Members to review and use the information on the Club's website or contact Jaci or Jennie directly if any aspects of the processes appear confusing, as they can quickly guide you through the process to a happy ending!!!

Jaci has also taken in-board the task of collating, designing and producing the Club's 'Green & White' broadsheet magazine, which will significantly reduce the external design and production costs.

Jaci and Jennie are certainly looking forward to moving into the new Clubhouse facilities and welcoming members and visitors to the Club at the new reception and Club merchandise shop, which we anticipate will generate markedly more revenue for the Club once up and running all year around.

In addition to managing the front office functions, Jaci has developed broad knowledge over the past four years in running of all the back office aspects of the role, which encompasses banking of incoming funds, payments to key service providers including Local, State and Federal Governments, LSV and SLISA, and to the numerous services that the Club requires, including water, gas, power, fuel, food, insurances, merchandise, first aid supplies, pest control, cleaning, repairs, phone and web-based telecoms, IT support and waste removal services.

With our Club's annual revenue approaching \$1M, the efficient and accurate processing of these transactions into our accounting system is a critical function of the role. The external auditing of our annual financial accounts has again confirmed that we manage these processes effectively.

The expert accounting support provided to the Club by the staff at West Carr & Harvey has been invaluable, and I would again like to thank Richard Carr's team for their advice and guidance as we continue to improve the accounting and internal reporting functions.

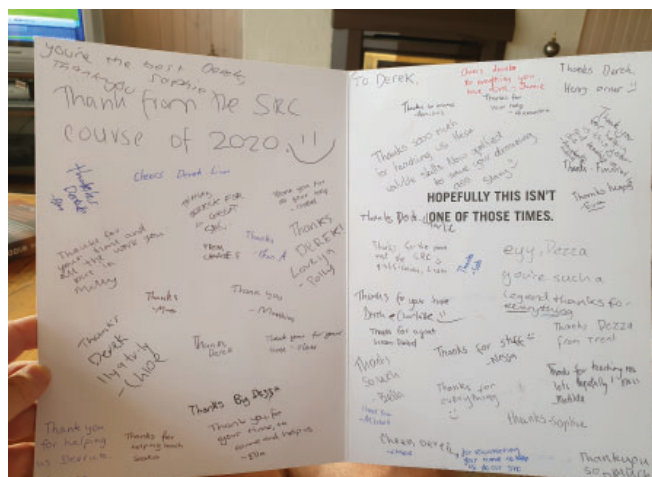
Our relationship with the Anglesea Community (Bendigo) Bank continues to be of significant value to the Club, and we were very pleased to receive a donation of \$10,000 from their Board to assist us with the fit-out of the new First Aid room in the Clubhouse. I would like to especially thank Jaci and Jennie, Jen McIntyre, Tom Cullen, Mike Martin, Ingilby Dickson, Richard Carr, Graeme and Prue Weber and Chris Foley for providing great support to me over the past year and I look forward to the 2020/21 season and the opening of our new Clubhouse.

I am certainly looking forward to seeing a re-surgency in the number of new and returning members signing up to join our great Club and to enjoy both the new John Worrell Room and the refreshed Ray Marsh Room and deck area. The 2020/21 season is shaping to be a memorable one for many reasons and our beaches will continue to be a great place to enjoy, while our members willingly volunteer to patrol the beaches keeping us and our visitors safe in the water.

Rescue Services Report

Anglesea Surf Rescue (ASR) once again provided an effective patrolling service to the community during the 2019/2020 season. Through both our volunteer and paid lifeguard services we ensured that our 66,847 beach visitors were protected whilst enjoying the beach this summer. This high level of service was made possible by effective pre-season planning by the ASR team.

This was Matt Anghie's first season as the Club's First Aid Officer and he was able to seamlessly transition into this role. Matt personally checked and then restocked all the first aid gear prior to the annual gear inspection and attentively re-ordered consumables as they were used. This attention to detail ensured we always had first aid equipment on hand for patrols, Nippers, the Rock2Ramp and other Club events.

Lachie Appleby (Gear Steward) and James Betson (IRB Manager) ensured all of our equipment and boats were repaired and serviced prior to the start of the season. This ensured that all of our key gear passed the annual readiness inspection in November, ready for the first patrol of the season. Their ongoing efforts throughout the year, particularly throughout the winter period are greatly appreciated and were crucial to ensure a smooth-running patrol season.

Emily King's (Patrol Coordinator) excellent preparation of the annual patrol roster and Freddie Graham's (Patrol Development Coordinator) attention to detail, ensuring all members had requalified, resulted in a great start to the season.

Similarly with the 2018/19 season, we had seven ASR teams. We had planned to provide 46 patrols between November and Easter Monday. However, unlike previous seasons, patrols were interrupted due to the outbreak of COVID-19. Following LSV's detailed advice, we were still able to provide 34 full patrols and 6 observational patrols, prior to the closure of all beaches state-wide. I would like to thank our patrolling members for their flexibility and patience during this time helping us to deliver our service to the community in line with ongoing LSV guidance.

Despite a slightly shortened season, it was still a busy one. Our patrol teams performed 3 rescues, 33 first aids and 1,493 preventative actions. In addition, LSV lifeguards who serviced Anglesea Main Beach and Point Roadknight throughout December and January were not needed to perform any rescues, however they did deliver 26 first aids and 1,489 preventative actions.

We thank all of our ASR Captains and Vice Captains as well as their teams whose ongoing commitment and professionalism were vital to ensuring that Anglesea met its minimum requirements with LSV.

During this summer, in order to increase engagement and to assist in fostering friendships and development, we assigned our newly qualified Bronze Medallion and SRC holders to patrol teams. It was fantastic to see so many of our members embrace this new approach and get involved with patrolling. We can't wait to see you all back again next summer!

This year Anglesea hosted its first Pink Zinc Patrol. This program aims to promote female leadership within surf lifesaving. The event was a success with a range of members coming in to hear our guest speakers sharing their insights on female leadership over morning tea, followed by a yoga session and then joining us for patrol in the afternoon. We are looking to grow this event in the future and a big thank you goes to Rachael Gay, Emily King and Jen McIntyre for helping to organise the event and to Heather Ramp, Emily King, Jess Handreck and Marli Wilkinson for sharing their experiences.

I would like to congratulate all our patrolling members for performing extremely well with LSV patrol inspections which saw Anglesea fair very well in the Patrol Service Efficiency and Standards Program. Anglesea's patrols were awarded the top in the Surf Coast region and also most improved. Well done to all!

I would like to thank all of our members who met the Club's requirement of 16 hours of patrol this season. Your commitment to the rescue services team is appreciated and we look forward to another great season in 2021.

Youth Development Report

Winter Activities

In an effort to encourage year-round youth involvement, enhance member retention and ultimately establish our Club as a central point for youth interaction and community, we ran a number of out-of-season events including a 60+ person adventure race on the June 2019 long weekend that included 11 Anglesea Primary School students moving through 5 distinct events in small teams. We were lucky enough to have great weather and an enthusiastic group of participants and organisers. The event was preceded by an enjoyable afternoon of lawn bowls and pizza, and whilst we hoped to make it an annual event in 2020, due to the coronavirus pandemic we will have to look to 2021 for the next iteration. Fortunately, we have secured a Surf Coast Shire Event Grant to assist with running this event.

We had 6 members obtain their Development Level Coaching Accreditation this year, and a number of parents went through training to become accredited officials which greatly boosted our ability to satisfy our obligations at local and State Championship carnivals. Thank you and congratulations to Matt Taylor, Ivor Morgan, Naantali Marshall, Marli Wilkinson, Tennille Ussher and Ben Gilbert.

Summer Program

The 19/20 season welcomed new faces and a new structure to key positions that aimed to deliver a year-long program for our youth members in an effort to secure them in what I hope, will be a lifelong engagement in all aspects of Anglesea SLSC life. Matt Keenan demonstrated his considerable dedication and organisational experience in the role of Big Nipper and combined with his wife Chris, oversaw a highly successful Summer Program where almost 500 Nippers ran, swam and paddled their way through 10 sessions. The use of instant messaging to disseminate information, a new Nipper/SRC handbook, de-centralised starts and healthier food options were popular and successful initiatives.

Many people made large contributions to ensure the Nippers thrived in a safe, engaging and enjoyable environment and I would like to specifically thank a number of them. Gina Khalil, our new Social and Catering Manager, made a great contribution in delivering post-session food and beverages, and she was ably assisted by her husband Sam and a group of parent volunteers. Jennifer McIntyre was instrumental in seeking out and securing sponsorship for the Summer Program and Patrick Haseler led a team of volunteer helpers in setting up and packing up, as our Gear and Facilities Manager. Fiona Fitzgerald organised a great group of water safety officers, and Ivor Morgan and Naantali Marshall provided age-specific coaching to each group over the program. Hats off to Derek Stott and Ingilby Dickson who instructed the SRC participants again this season. There were additional challenges including the off-site training and a large group with over 60 participants, however the program was highly successful and pleasingly it was terrific to see so many of the participants immediately getting involved with patrols.

I would wholeheartedly like to thank Matt Keenan, Gina, Jennifer, Patrick, Fiona, Ivor, Naantali, Matt Taylor, Matilda, Derek, Ingilby, the Supporters Group and all of the parent Age Managers and assistants for all of your efforts in delivering the Summer Program.

Surf Sports Competition and Leadership Camps

Overall, we came 10th in the club point score, and on a points-per-competitor basis, we finished 4th which are both excellent results. Pleasingly, we were also able to field a competitive March Past team led by flagbearer Nora McKellar in their Club t-shirts sponsored by Jim's Self Storage.

Our future focus for competition includes rebranding Dolphins training into Club Training Days, available to Club members of all ages, where we aim to develop fitness and surf skills in a fun and sociable format and facilitate the transition to senior competition with access to full size boards and transition surf skis. The best way to find information is by subscribing to Anglesea SLSC Surf Sports on Team App.

Dibdin Fitzgerald represented Victoria at the interstate competition on the Sunshine Coast for the second year running, and at the State Endurance Championships, Jemima Fitzgerald came 4th in the U14 4km board race and Dibdin came 3rd in the U15 4km board race. At the Australian Open Water Swimming Championships, Noah O'Donnell came 2nd in the 14 years 5km event. Well done Jemima, Dibs and Noah – these are fantastic achievements and a testament to the incredible amount of hard work and commitment

you have made to your training! Making the transition to senior carnivals can be a challenge and we were proud to see Charlotte McKenzie, Jemima Fitzgerald, Matilda McIntyre, Nessa Cooney-Hunt, Lekaya Carson and Mitch Reither competing at the senior Anglesea carnival for the first time.

ASLSC also had an increasing presence at other LSV events. A huge congratulations to Jemima Fitzgerald who was the winner of the Mike Martin Junior Champion Lifesaver award (named after our life member and former Anglesea and LSV president), whilst we additionally had 4 members (Chloe Fitzgerald, Ellie Morgan, Matilda Daffy and Olivia Hope) chosen to attend the Under 13 leadership development camp which was unfortunately postponed due to the pandemic.

I would like again to thank the Anglesea Supporters Group and Bears who have provided generous assistance to make some strategic equipment purchases in order to promote retention and progression of our older Nippers to the youth age group and for supporting a number of 'Come and Try Days'. Here, new and old members were invited to experience surf boat rowing and board/ski paddling in a controlled and safe introductory format.

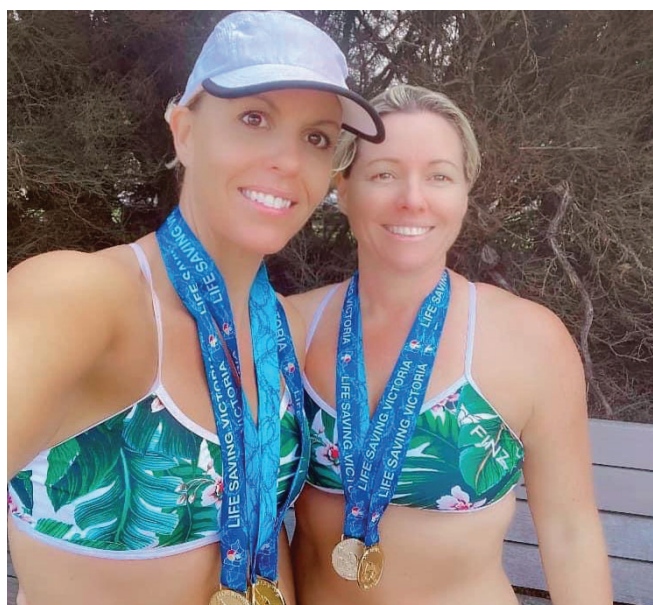

Clubs recognised for safety standards

FAIRHAVEN Surf Life Saving Club (SLSC) and Anglesea SLSC has been recognised by Life Saving Victoria (LSV) for their exemplary lifesaving standards.

LSV's Patrol Service Efficiency and Standards Program (PSESP) has patrol inspectors who will visit clubs at unspecified times to evaluate how well clubs are meeting criteria.

The inspectors score clubs on a broad range of criteria, ranging from the clubs' use of appropriate signage and equipment, through to the rescue skills of the lifesavers on patrol.

The evaluation can include theory questions for lifesavers on duty and mock rescues.

At the end of a season, LSV gives awards to the top three clubs in the state.

Fairhaven SLSC came equal second with Venus Bay SLSC.

Fairhaven SLSC was also recently a finalist for LSV's 2020 Awards of Excellence. Club president Darren West said at the time he believed the club's improved beach safety had been a factor in this.

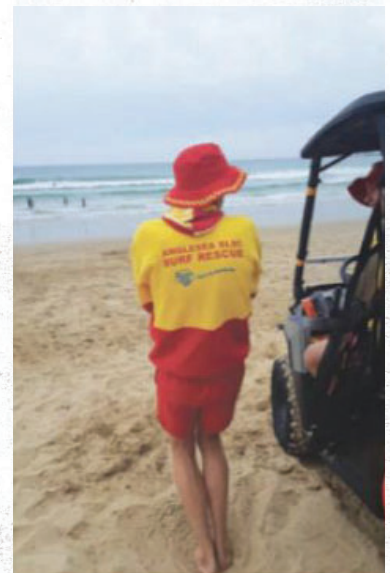
"We've made some changes to our patrol roster to ensure we've got the best-qualified patrol on every weekend that we possibly can."

LSV also gives awards for the best and most improved clubs in their respective areas (the clubs in the top three are ineligible for these awards).

Anglesea claimed both these categories for the Surf Coast region.

Anglesea SLSC Rescue Services director Elise Langford said the club's success had come from an all-encompassing approach to patrols.

"For us, it's about bringing everyone who is on patrol on the journey, so when we get inspections everyone who is on patrol is doing the right thing and meeting standards," Ms Langford said.



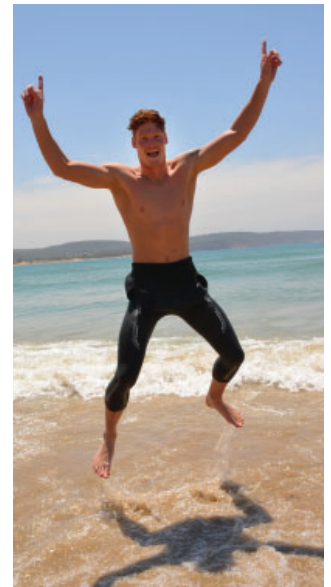
Anglesea SLSC was named both the best and most improved club in the Surf Coast.

"Internally at the club, we've been trying to put an emphasis on bringing the younger people across over the past three years, including a lot of scenario training for them when we have the opportunity to do so."

This evaluation generally occurs twice a season, although COVID-19 limited inspectors to one visit for the 2019/20 season.

Ms Langford said the recognition was encouraging.

"At the end of the day our job is about trying to create that safe environment, so it reinforces to us that we're doing the right thing."



Rock2Ramp Report

The 2019 Burson Rock2Ramp Ocean Swim was held on Saturday 28th December 2019 attracting a record number of swimmers, with participation also at record highs for the female swimmers.

A total of 1,170 swimmers participated in perfect conditions. Men and women came from far and wide, including as far away as the UK, to don the cap and goggles and plunge into the crystal-clear waters of Anglesea's stunning Point Roadknight beach.

For the first time, the Rock2Ramp included a 600m Ocean swim designed to boost participation for those moving from the underage swims or people who are new to open age swimming. With nearly 100 people completing in these events – it will definitely be a permanent fixture on the schedule.

With Anglesea SLSC recipients of funding from VicHealth with the 'This Girl Can' Campaign – the 600m swim was a focus for getting women off the towels and into the water. It was rewarding to see the campaign come to fruition with come-back queens of all ages, shapes and sizes, handing the towel-holding over and hitting the waves.

Member Development Report

The 2019/2020 season forced the Member Development team to be flexible and adaptable as we came to terms with the realities of offering both courses and camps across a range of venues throughout December and January. Camp Wilken, the Club's offsite facility, Anglesea RSL and what was left of the Clubhouse were all used to deliver high quality training to all those who wished to improve their skills and understanding.

In addition to these logistical challenges, we were also managing significant new changes instigated by LSV in relation to compliance and accountability. While these changes will over time, help to improve the quality of training at a State level, the immediate impact was to reduce our capacity to run courses on our own timeframes and without the need to first seek approval from LSV. The positive of all of this is that by introducing a consistent 'State wide' approach, Anglesea members will have a greater opportunity to access online and flexible learning and the potential to undertake training out of season and at other venues. However, the changes did reduce the numbers of accredited trainers who were able to assist with training activities during this season.

To this end I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank the following;

Building Redevelopment

The 2019-2020 season will always remain as a memorable one in the collective memory of the Anglesea SLSC.

At the end of June 2019 we signed the contract with Foursquare Construction Management Pty Ltd to undertake the redevelopment of the old Clubhouse and works commenced onsite on July 15th 2019. In quick succession the old Clubhouse was demolished, excavations commenced and in a few weeks the new building started to come out of the ground.

Works have continued throughout the year and at the time of writing FourSq anticipate completion of their contract around September 2020. One unexpected consequence of the redevelopment has been the need to undertake more extensive upgrades to the existing building than had been anticipated. This relates to improving the fire rating of the structure and improving the energy efficiency of the Ray Marsh Room. Following discussions with FourSq and the building surveyors it has been agreed that FourSq will complete their contracted scope of works and that the Club will undertake the necessary upgrade to the existing building in the next couple of years, thus deferring the cost impact.



The Redevelopment Sub-Committee has always been of the view that the redevelopment would cost around \$5.4 to \$5.5 million and remains confident that this goal will be achieved. Our cumulative fund raising now totals just over \$5.1m with significant support from the State and Federal Governments and the Surf Coast Shire Council. In addition to this public funding, we have had the fantastic support of our Patrons, Members and company supporters who have, through the creative and tireless encouragement of our Fundraising Chair, Ingilby Dickson, contributed just short of \$2m to the redevelopment.

Our current project funding gap of \$400k, although covered with Bendigo Bank debt, is our Summer collection target for those still able to support this once in a lifetime opportunity for the future of the Club.

The works clearly had an impact on Club operations during the season but the relevant Directors and Club volunteers all worked hard to deliver the normal range of activities.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Redevelopment Sub-Committee of Tom Cullen, Chris Foley, Ingilby Dickson, Graeme Weber, Noel Langford and Andrew Suttle along with our project managers, the PDS Group, for their valuable time and professional contributions.

The 7:30am project meeting in Richmond were a definite challenge but have ensured that we will have a facility to be proud of and one that will be as long lasting as that which was provided to us by Ray Marsh and his team in the early 1960's.

Anglesea Hall of Fame Inductees 2019/2020

Thank you to the Board for the support of the Hall of Fame concept since 2012. This year's inductees were announced and invited into the Hall of Fame during the Anglesea Carnival Day lunch, a very fitting environment to highlight Surf Sports Athletes(teams)/Coaches/Contributors of the past whilst a new generation are creating their own history.

I firmly believe recognition in any organisation is a critical foundation of a successful culture, and even more so in a volunteer organisation.

The Anglesea SLSC Surf Sports Hall of Fame was developed in 2012 in conjunction with the Club's 60th Year celebrations. I would like to acknowledge the inaugural inductees; Robert King, Stuart Fox, Shane Edmonds, Abby Lewtas, the 1960's Senior R&R Team and our Legend John Worrell OAM. The second group of inductees was announced in 2015, with Peter Van Miltenburg, Warren Clarke, Peter White and Bruce 'Smoothy' Thompson all being recognised.

Late in 2019 we called for nominations from the members for the next class of inductees.

The following criteria were observed when nominations were being assessed by the Hall of Fame advisory committee.

- Recognising, preserving and honouring:
 - athletes/teams
 - coaches and
 - contributors to the Surf Sports program at Anglesea SLSC
 - sustained excellence and significant accomplishments at Club, State, National and International level
- Sportsmanship – Integrity – Character
- Financial membership for at least 7 years
- A maximum of 5 inductees per year, plus one Legend inductee.

I would like to thank those that nominated and the members of the advisory committee.

I would also like to thank our resident Historian, Prue Weber for her dossier of statistics on each inductee. Always very thorough with the detail.

This year we had three inductees to the Anglesea SLSC Surf Sports Hall of Fame:

Vanessa Jacobs (nee Guest) joined Anglesea SLSC in 1995, after completing her BM at Pt. Leo in 1993. Vanessa was a fierce competitor both on the training track and in competition. She was an integral part of and competed through the halcyon days of the Anglesea Beach Team circa 1995-2005. Her CV of achievements highlight that Vanessa was a dominant force in Female Beach events for a sustained period at State, National and World Titles in both Open and Masters. Making Open Australian Flag finals multiple years in a row. The pinnacle of her career being an epic battle with her teammate (Elly Hutton) on the beach at Kurrawa in 1999 to secure a famous Australian Title.

John 'Balls' Baldock joined Anglesea SLSC in 1965 and has been representing the Club and the Surf Sports area in some capacity since then. If you do the maths, this is approximately 54-years. A commitment like that is considered outstanding and worthy, even before we mention his achievements.

John was part of the pioneering days of the Anglesea Beach Team in the late 60's and thru the 70's and was a 'bull' in the flags area with two Open Victorian Titles and multiple Open Beach relay titles.

However, I know he would say his greatest achievement and thrill in Surf Lifesaving would be his role as a coach, mentor and friend to the next wave of beachies which spans 20+ years and continues today.

He, along with his partner in coaching, Peter Van Miltenburg, have been instrumental in developing, not only great athletes who have achieved multiple World, Australian and State medals, but great human beings as well.

The person who nominated John put it this way, 'John is more than an outstanding coach and competitor. He is a person of excellent character, always ready to help, mentor and encourage fellow members'. John is an example of a truly dedicated surf lifesaver, who has made an invaluable contribution to the Club and surf sports, and deserves recognition by induction into the Anglesea SLSC Surf Sports Hall of Fame.

Anglesea Junior R&R Team 1965/66. R&R has been a mainstay of the Anglesea Surf Sports team since the club inception in 1952. Obviously with all clubs, sections go through periods of sustained success and on the flip side, barely enough members to make a team.

However, the 60's were a strong period for the Anglesea R&R team, with the influence of technical coaches such as John Worrell and Robert Morgan, Anglesea was fortunate to win Australian Titles in both Senior and Junior teams during the decade. With the Senior R&R team as inaugural inductees into the Hall of Fame in 2012, we now welcome the Junior R&R team.

The team consisting of Grahame Fletcher, Michael McConnell, Wayne Leslie, Barry Anderson, David Young, Doug Solly and Richard Holding. Coached by Robert Morgan and managed by John Fidler, captured the 1966 Australian Title at Coolangatta. With most of the team backing up from their Bronze medal in 1965, this team was nearly unbeatable over the summers of 1965 and 1966, including winning two Victorian titles.

Well done to all inductees. We look forward to honouring them in our new Clubhouse.

Peter F Maishman OAM 27/10/1938-11/12/2019

Peter was made a Life Member of Point Lonsdale SLSC in 1970 as he had gained his BM in 1955 with them. He was asked to join Anglesea in 1984/85 to be Ski Captain as son Tim was to be part of the Club's successful Taplin team. Peter held this position until 1988 when he became Vice President in charge of Competition. This team was Gold Medalists at the Victorian Titles and Bronze Medalists at the Australian Titles in 1985. Anglesea was off to good beginning.

During Peter's time at Anglesea he was a great motivator and driver of competition activities for the Club, and he encouraged over 20 ski paddlers to compete at Carnivals and the Club was often able to field A,B & C teams in the one event. Barry shared the Best Clubman Award in 1972/73 with Ajax Sutherland and in recognition of his service was awarded Life Membership of Anglesea SLSC in 1979.

Within the club his passion was surfboats where he started as a Junior in 1961 and then went on to row and sweep for over 35 years including as sweep of the club's inaugural female boat crew in 1995/96 and 1996/97. Club legend has it that Barry played a key role in the minimisation of 'boaties bum' by his introduction of fibreglass seats in place of the traditional varnished wood.

Barry was awarded SLSC's 25 and 50 Year Service Awards and was honoured by the club in 2001 when the club's new surfboat was christened the 'Barry Marsh', an honour given to very few.

Barry contributed in many ways to the development of Anglesea SLSC and we will miss his kindness and fellowship but in particular his impish smile which, at his Memorial Service, his former National Service Platoon Commander noted always suggested Barry was up to something, but you never know what!

Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club Inc Financial Report

I hereby present the Annual Financial Statement for the year ending 30 April 2020 for the Club.

This year has been very busy managing the funding of the new building development in addition to the normal club operations.

In accordance with Accounting Standards we are required to include the Grants received for the new building of \$2,585,651 as income although the expenditure of \$3,083,268 is not included as expenses and capitalised to the Balance Sheet.

This has resulted in a Net Surplus of \$2,866,604.

As at 30 April 2020 our net cash reserves were \$786,031. (2019 \$1,032,235)

The total equity of the Club as at 30 April 2020 was \$5,617,748 (2019 \$2,751,144)

Important Receipts are as follows:

The Financial Statements are prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards and therefore I draw your attention to Note 2 where I have highlighted the impact of the funding of new club house in the profit and loss statement. This note excludes all receipts and expenses relating to the building development which results in a net loss for the year of \$205,574 (2019 Loss \$51,532).

This loss has been addressed by the Board and they are confident that it will be reduced significantly with the new club house and the sources of income that will be able to be generated.

Captain Moonlite's revenue to the club was reduced due to the need to shutdown their facilities in early March as the new building construction progressed.

I would like to thank Jaci and Jennie for managing the Club's finances for the year.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and under the historical cost convention, except for certain assets, which, as noted, have been written down to fair value as a result of impairment. Unless otherwise stated, the accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the prior year.

The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Inventories acquired at no cost or for nominal consideration are measured at the current replacement cost as at the date of acquisition.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is initially recorded at the cost of acquisition or fair value less, if applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Plant and equipment that has been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, is valued and recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired. The plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure that the carrying amount is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the utilisation of the assets and the subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in estimating recoverable amounts.

Freehold land and buildings are measured at their fair value, based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by independent external valuers, less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount of land and buildings arising on revaluation are credited in equity to a revaluation surplus. Decreases against previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves in equity. All other decreases are charged to profit or loss.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is offset against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables, including distributions receivable, are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company that remain unpaid at 30 April 2018. Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. They are subject to normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

Financial Statements

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Revenue from the rendering of services is recognised upon the delivery of the services to customers.

Revenue from commissions is recognised upon delivery of services to customers.

Revenue from interest is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Revenue from dividends is recognised when the entity has a right to receive the dividend.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Goods and Services Tax

Transactions are recognised net of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when the entity receives the grant, when it is probable that the entity will receive the economic benefits of the grant and the amount can be reliably measured.

If the grant has conditions attached which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the grant, the recognition of the revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Where the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value back to the grant contributor, the transaction is considered a reciprocal transaction and the revenue is recognised as a liability in the balance sheet until the required service has been completed, otherwise the income is recognised on receipt.

Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club Inc receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for a nominal or zero value. These assets are recognised at their fair value on the date of acquisition in the balance sheet, with an equivalent amount of income recognised in the income statement.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Government Grants

Government grants received are recognised as revenue on a basis to match the recognition of revenue with costs incurred in the project.

Qualified Opinion

Provisions are measured using the best estimate available of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the entity and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue from interest is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Revenue from dividends is recognised when the entity has a right to receive the dividend.

A review is substantially less in scope than an audit conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards and consequently does not enable us to obtain assurance that we would become aware of all significant matters that might be identified in an audit. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion.

Independence

In conducting our review, we have complied with the independence requirements of the Australian professional accounting bodies.

Financial Statements - Foundation

Other Matter-Subsequent Event-potential impact of COVID-19 Outbreak

I draw attention to subsequent events surrounding the COVID-19 outbreak that have had an impact on the financial markets after reporting date. This event may cause a financial impact not currently disclosed in the financial statements and I am not able to determine any result from this abnormal event.

My opinion is not qualified in respect of this matter.

Basis for qualified opinion

Receipts are a source of revenue for the Anglesea Surf Lifesaving Club Foundation Pty Ltd. It is impracticable to establish controls over the collection of these revenue streams prior to the entry in its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us regarding this revenue is limited, our review procedures with respect to receipt's has been restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We are therefore unable to express an opinion on whether receipts and obtained by Anglesea Surf Lifesaving Club Foundation Pty Ltd are complete.

Qualified Opinion

Based on our review which is not an audit, except for the effects on the financial report of such adjustments, if any, as might have been required had the limitation on our audit procedures referred to in the *Basis for qualified opinion* paragraph not existed, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the 30 April 2020 financial report of the Anglesea Surf Lifesaving Club Foundation Pty Ltd does not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Anglesea Surf Lifesaving Club Foundation Pty Ltd as at 30 April 2020, and of its financial performance for the year ended on that date, in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards.

Basis of accounting and restriction on distribution

Without modifying our conclusion, we draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist the Anglesea Surf Lifesaving Club Foundation Pty Ltd to meet the requirements of the Foundation's rules. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.
