PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I would like to start this report by saying how proud I am of the work Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club does each and every day. We have provided over 70 years of surf lifesaving services at Anglesea and its surrounds, and our connection to the community we serve has never been this great and never have our services been more required. As a Club we are meeting our beach patrolling requirements, which included responding to a mass rescue, we are extending ourselves by providing first aid services at community events and we are even teaching the community how to use defibrillators. All these activities ensure that we are entwined in the fabric of our community, and it is you, our dedicated members, who volunteer to make this all possible. Your efforts enable our Club to deliver exceptional surf lifesaving services while protecting & strengthening our community.

My vision is that our Club's volunteering culture gets even stronger. That culture is what enables us to continue to fulfil our primary objective of meeting our patrol requirements and lifesaving responsibilities for the season. The volunteering culture also provides us the platform to deliver additional services to our members and the wider community. To do all of this we need more volunteers.

My priority is to have more of our qualified members participating in patrols. That would be a big help to our small, but dedicated, patrol teams. Anglesea SLSC is fortunate to have the most up to date lifesaving equipment, great facilities, the best behind the scenes support and the absolute best beach to patrol. So, if you are a qualified Anglesea SLSC member, I ask you- What's stopping you from patrolling?

My hope is that a clear understanding of why we exist and why we train children, and adolescents, also flows through to Nippers and their parents. We do as much as we can to educate and develop junior' surf lifesaving skills in a fun environment where they can grow, form lasting friendships, and develop an affinity with the Club. We do this in the hope that they will put up their hands one day to be future Club volunteers- patrollers, educators, competitors, and leaders of the Club.

In terms of membership, we continue to maintain strong levels across all categories. The Club's retention of its existing members is sound, and we continue to attract new members across all categories. This stability puts the Club in a good position to meet both its near and long-term lifesaving obligations.

Increased participation in surf sports continues to be an important part of our Club's culture. Apart from the thrill and enjoyment of competition, surf sport has direct links with fit and healthy life savers who patrol our beach. While I may be somewhat biased, the rebirth of our IRB team is a significant development and one that will provide an alternative pathway and opportunities for our members, as well as improving our rescue readiness.

As you'll read in reports further on, we've had fabulous success in the master's, juniors, surf boat and beach sections. We have opportunities for further development in the open and underage water sections, especially if we can retain the current youth competitors in U13, U14 and U15 age groups. Retention of junior competitors has been an issue across the State with a 40% reduction from 2020 to 2023. Pleasingly our Club's junior retention has not been impacted to this degree.

Much like last year, this season has seen some terrific results for our major fundraisers. Our Club members and the Anglesea community once again opened their hearts and wallets for the annual DoorKnock. We had a great turn out for the very well organised Rock 2 Ramp and the annual Golf Day was an outstanding success. The success of each of these initiatives was the result of hard work, good planning and preparation by each of the teams responsible. My thanks go out to the leaders of these fundraising activities and to all of you who volunteered your time.

Over the year, our Club has had terrific support from ongoing and new sponsors. We are also extremely grateful to the Club's key supporters, who continue to donate funds, goods and services to ensure that the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club can be the best it can be. Our Club cannot exist without all your support so from the bottom of our hearts – THANKS!

During 2023 our Club was exposed to the financial challenges that all Australians experienced. Despite significant cost and interest rate increases throughout the year the Club had a positive Operating Cash Flow and was able to meet its debt repayments. Going forward the Club will focus on increased sponsorship and fundraising as part of a broader approach to mitigate further cost and interest rate increases.

A very personal thanks to the Board who have been incredible this year and have helped the Club navigate the many and varied issues we face from both internal and external sources. You give so much of your time, all without asking for anything in return! You are all amazing. To those Board members that have given so much and are stepping away from your roles, we thank you. To those joining the Board for the upcoming year we look forward to your energy and eagerness for the challenges ahead.

Finally, as noted above, volunteering is at the heart of what we do. Please put your hand up and offer help when you see someone sweeping out the IRB shed, cooking on a BBQ on a hot day, or processing Nipper applications on sign up day.

VICE PRESIDENT - OPERATIONS REPORT

2022/23 was a season where the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club returned to a semblance of normality. It was our first year without any lockdowns since the Covid-19 pandemic and didn't we all enjoy it. The Club was a hive of activity throughout the entire season, and it was rewarding to see our members:

- Enjoying the beach and keeping it safe for the broader community;
- Participating in training and development opportunities;
- Proudly representing our Club in junior and senior Surf Sports;
- Engaging in major Club fundraising activities, such as the Rock2Ramp, DoorKnock and the Golf Day;
- Socialising and having fun at various Club events, such as the Club's 70th Anniversary, the Ladies Lunch and the Nipper family night;
- Congregating on the deck to relax, catch up, and take in the views across our amazing beach, grab a bite at Love House or share a beverage at Jimpy's Bar; and
- Making greater use of our Club facilities.

Much of the above would not have been possible without the remarkable group of ASLSC members who volunteered their time and skills for the benefit of all our Club members, our sponsors and donors, the Club's employees, and all our service providers.

As I noted last year, volunteering is the life blood of our Surf Club and I thank all of you who were able to step up during the year.

Our Club strives to continuously improve in all areas. To do that we really need help from more of our members. Your contributions, no matter how large or small, will benefit all our current and future members. Your contributions also help you to connect with the Club, develop friendships and strengthen Anglesea's overall Club Culture.

I cannot over emphasise the importance of volunteering as part of our Club Culture. We need strength in both these areas if we truly want to underpin our Club's future. Consequently, if you are a new member or one of our existing members who was unable to assist during the past years, I implore you to come forward and help out in the years ahead.

The past season saw a successful launch of a new restaurant, Love House, which is located in the Ray Marsh Room at the Club. From its inception, the Love House menu and level of service has been a big hit with all age groups of our members and the wider community. The Club appreciates the efforts of the Love House team, particularly Tom Lapenas, Simon Paramonov, and Tom McGrath in providing us with a quality offering that differentiates the Club from other dining alternatives in Anglesea.

During the year the Club spent considerable time negotiating a renewed lease over the land that the Club currently occupies with the Great Ocean Road Coast and Parks Authority (GORCAPA). The Club is appreciative of GORCAPA's efforts during this process and was pleased that we were able to secure an acceptable outcome. The renewed lease has the same expiry date, 31 December 2034, as the Club's previous lease.

During the year the Governance Committee received feedback on the proposed amendments to the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club Constitution from legal counsel at Life Saving Victoria. We are now working through an on-going engagement process with ASLSC members. The Governance Committee will consider the feedback that it receives from these engagements before a revised draft is taken to the Board. Ultimately, the Board will need to decide what amendments it supports being brought forward for members to vote on.

In closing this report, I would like to touch on the Club's financial position. First, I thank Richard Carr and Mark Griffin of West Carr & Harvey for their ongoing commitment to organise the Club's End of Year Financials, on an in-kind basis. Secondly, I note that the Club experienced significant cost increases during the last year. These increases included the cost of goods and services, utilities and interest rate charges and should be of no surprise to our members as it reflects what has taken place across the broader community. Given that the prevailing inflationary environment is not expected to subside in the near-term, the economic outlook for Australia is challenging. Consequently, the Board will increase its focus on new opportunities to increase Club revenue through fundraising and sponsorship, while it tightens its handle on Club expenditure.

Please be assured that our Club is committed to remain financially viable and to provide our members and the broader community with quality lifesaving services and associated amenities.

Our Nipper program is something to hang our hats on. Over 500 Nippers plus 24 Starfish Nippers over a two week period runs so well, and it is so great to walk along the sand, watching the kids having a blast and the parents and water safety all working together to deliver this program. Whilst they might not all turn into future lifesavers, they are all learning essential water safety skills that they can all take into the rest of their lives. The Starfish Nippers is nothing short of incredible and continues the Clubs commitment to inclusion for all. Well done to Patrick Haseler & Matilda Cameron on leading your teams through these programs. It is not just this period of time that it takes you to deliver the program, as there is a lot of work that goes into the preparation each year.

Our Youth Development continues to grow under the leadership of Sam Hume. For the competitors who head to these carnivals, it is a great milestone in your lives, and I hope you can look back on it fondly in future years with great memories. At Warrnambool for State Titles, there was a great show of camaraderie amongst our Club. There were some standout performances with lots of kids coming away with medals but most importantly, huge smiles especially our Under 9 boys winning silver in the Board Relay. I think they are still sleeping with their medals around their necks! The highlights for me were at night, sitting around as a Club, with everyone enjoying either Simon Spink's spag bowl or Scott Tannahill's paella and hearing how all the groups did each day. I think Simon & Scott may be booked in every year now!

Senior competition is coming along and continues to rebuild. Whilst our R&R teams have taken a much earned break from dominating at the top of their sport, our Youth competitors are coming along nicely with some great results across the board. Our boat crews had some up and down results with our girls having to succumb to injury mid-season after some great results early. A keen U19 boys crew have now hit the water and will not only be great rowers but great Club members. Scott Tannahill already has them finalising their IRB crew awards and drivers are the next step. Our local men's crew managed to take gold at Masters States and make the final in Reserves the next day after 3 weeks of training, so suffice to say, they are firing for next season already!

Over at the Aussie's in Perth, our beachies dominated given their results in Victoria, they entered the pinnacle event high on confidence and didn't disappoint. They ended up with great results yet again and show what a great long term program we have under the watchful eyes of our super coaches Peter Van Miltenburg and John Baldock with Adam Martin managing the team.

Whilst this isn't about singling out anyone, I'm going to do it anyway. Naantali Marshall's results at the Aussies was simply amazing. A perfect score of 4 golds from 4 events is something for, not only Naantali, but the Club to be proud of. I'm sure it got to the point on the line where the others knew they were racing for second place, thus the dominance of Naant!

During the colder months, there is still plenty going on with our Club back into IRB racing! Well done to all involved. It has been great to see so much action continues, when our Club can often be quiet. The people involved are not just petrol heads, all of them are great contributors to the Club and I cannot wait to see this continue to grow for years to come.

Patrols are the reason we have a Club. That is the simple way to look at why we are here. Yes, there are so many areas within the Club and there are many moving parts. However, we are a Surf Lifesaving Club first and foremost and we patrol the beaches around Anglesea. As we move past the COVID era, challenges around volunteerism are many. We are working on many ideas to rebuild our patrolling numbers in the ASR areas and to get better retention through our Bronze Camps and courses. Lachie Eaton and his Member Development team continue to do an amazing job putting through all the new awards, the requals and the logistical nightmare that is Bronze Camp. We put through another 53 new Bronze awards this year and as mentioned above, we are working on ways to transition more of these new Bronzies into ASR members for years to come.

As always, the work that the Supporters Group do to assist all of these areas is greatly appreciated. We all know that some of what we do can be quite costly and the Supporters Group are always there to lend a helping hand. They are always willing to help, and I know they get a kick out of seeing the Club flourishing.

To finish, I want to share something that happened this summer. If you want to have an idea on the impact of what patrols make to the beach going public, all you have to do is hear what happened on January 14 this year. It was a pretty normal summer day at Anglesea, small swell, packed beach and families enjoying a great beach day. All of a sudden there was a commotion in front of the boat ramp and before we knew it, we had a serious rescue on our hands. The work done by Patrol Captain Donald Bryce and his team was amazing to witness. There were a few other Club families down on the beach this day and everyone sprung into action, without hesitation. Special mention to Jan Marsh for looking after all of our kids! The way everyone worked together reminded me why we do this. Not only were there a few experienced patrol members, who were helping with the patients, there were a number of younger SRC members on their first patrol and they simply nailed it. It can be a very confronting scene whether it be your first or fifteenth rescue and the members did an amazing job. I hope that it inspires these younger members to continue patrolling and are around for a long time. Remember, because of the work you all did that day, these people got to go home to their families. You should all be very proud of this. If you weren't there it may have ended very differently.

Here's to a great season by all, like I said at the start, we know we have areas of improvement, but work has already started on making next season even better. We have a great Club that has a very storied history and I look forward to us all building on it, well into the future.

This season, they have very generously assisted with funding to ensure patrol members are well fed and looked after when they're on the beach. On behalf of the patrol team, thank you for your continued assistance to our Club.

I'm also extremely grateful to the Captain's and Vice-Captains of our ASR's this season. They're the ones, who each week, ensure that they have sufficient numbers to keep our beaches safe, as well as providing invaluable knowledge, skills, and leadership to all patrolling members. Further, our limited number of ASR's this season meant that (somewhat unfairly) the remaining 5 were picking up quite a bit of slack and doing extra hours. YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

REPORT

Starfish Coordinator Matilda Cameron along with all the trainers and families, again ran a highly successful Starfish program for 24 Starfish this season, with fantastic engagement of the Starfish on the beach and in the water. Our Starfish Trainer of the Year was Jack Livingston who worked with Jeremy. Together they exemplify the great relationships that can form and are an absolute highlight of the program.

The Summer Program was led by Big Nipper Patrick Haseler who, in his first year, did a great job stepping up to this role. Patrick's relationships with the parents and kids, his enthusiasm, and his "can do" attitude are all central to his ability to bring everyone together to produce a fantastic program. Ably assisting Patrick this year was James Pollard who oversaw a team of workers responsible for the set up and pack down of each session, as well as the post session BBQs.



A huge thank you also to Ben Gilbert who again coordinated the water safety for the Summer Program and to the many IRB drivers, crew, and water safety personnel that assisted with keeping our nippers safe in the water. A real highlight for the program was a visit from the Life Saving Victoria rescue helicopter who enthralled our nippers at one of our sessions this year thanks to the coordination of pilot and club member Wayne Cartwright. Club championships were held in tricky conditions again this year and we are really due for some light conditions next year! Our Family Night saw a large number of members attend at the football club for some food, company and presentations.

Matt Montemurro from the Marine Mammal Foundation attended one of our sessions again this year and engaged with several age groups on the diverse mammals that inhabit the oceans in and around Anglesea, and the impact of human litter entering our aquatic environments. Matt is an engaging speaker and brings great enthusiasm and knowledge to his presentations and we look forward to working with him in future years.

Now into its third year, our local Nipper program ran through November-December, February-March. Attended by up to 30 local Nippers, the program provides additional ways for local children and their parents to engage with the Club, improve their confidence and skills in the water, and strengthen the Club

community. A huge thank you to Matt Taylor who coordinated and ran the program this year with help from Trina Porter, Peter Williams and a host of parents including Andrew Gooday and Mim Martin, who assisted with water safety, first aid and set up. Matt Taylor's huge contribution to the Club over many years in his roles as Club Secretary, Coach, Official, Assessor and as a lead in both the local and summer Nipper Program were suitably recognised when he was awarded the Graeme Long Memorial Medal for Life Saving Victoria's Volunteer of the Year in 2022. This award is an absolute highlight for Matt, and the Club, and incredibly well deserved. We are so grateful for your help and proud of your achievements, Matt.

The Club's Youth activities were supported by a number of great sponsors including SG Hiscock, Great Ocean Properties, Ocean Road Landscaping, A-Z Plumbing, Big4 Anglesea Holiday Park, the Great Ocean Road Chocolaterie, Anglesea Fruitz, and New Balance. These sponsors help with providing the nippers, age managers and water safety with essential equipment such as rash shirts, hats and t-shirts. A huge thank you to each of them from myself and the Club for their contribution, which keeps our members seen, safe and shaded. I would specifically like to thank SG Hiscock who have been a major supporter of the Club Nipper program for the past 3 years and are concluding their sponsorship this season. Please support the sponsors of your Club if you are in need of fund management, property sales and purchases, holiday accommodation, local tradespersons, local food or activewear.

Many of the nippers who competed successfully across the season have regularly attended our Club Training Days (CTDs) throughout the year and over summer. In these sessions the focus is on having fun, learning foundational surf and beach skills, developing fitness and strengthening friendships. The Anglesea nipper competition team finished 6th overall at the Victorian Nipper Titles at Warrnambool on 10-12 March, which was a fantastic effort. Coaches Ivor Morgan, Naantali Marshall, Matt Taylor and I were exceptionally proud of the team comradery and effort we saw over three long competition days. With a team of fewer than 40 competitors, Anglesea had some fantastic team and individual results. With enough members to make up two teams, our U10 girls won medals in Aqua Cam, beach relay, flags, long run, sprint, board relay, surf teams, wade, wade relay and surf race. Congratulations to Ella Robertson, Ava Macgowan, Charlotte Marsh, Tessa Parr, Mia Barbirotto, Maya Mcconnell, Amelia Charles and Edith Paterson. Our U11 girls were spearheaded by Kate Taylor who took home two gold and one bronze individual medals, and combined with her teammates Zoe Hume, Maddie Crozier and Gemma Jurcevic to come second in the Aqua Cam. Our U12 girls won gold in the beach relay (Eliza Parr, Eloise Spinks, Ruby Macgowan, Mary-Jane Gilbert) and bronze in the board rescue (Eloise Spinks and Mary-Jane Gilbert). Eliza Parr won gold in the beach sprint and flags, and bronze in the long run, while Eloise Spinks won bronze in the flags. In the U13s, Summer Morgan won gold in the board, surf race, and iron, and combined with Ruby Macgowan to come second in the board rescue. In the U13 boys, Morgan Taylor had a fantastic finish to come second in the iron, which was a fitting end to his time as a nipper, and to all the effort that he has put into his training and racing over many years.

At the Youth/Senior Victorian championships held at Ocean Grove on 24-26 February, Anglesea youth had some fantastic results over three long and trying days. In the U14s, Jas Hume won gold in the long run, silver in the iron and tube race, and bronze in the board and swim. Emily Thomas, Evie Theodore and Amelia Parr made various finals in the swim, board, iron and tube, while on the beach Evie and Amelia made the sprint final and Evie the flags final. In the U15s, Ellie Morgan won bronze in the tube and made finals in the surf race, board and iron. Jas and Ellie combined for gold in the board rescue and silver in the 2x1km run, and all the girls were just out of the medals in the other team races.

At the Australian Championships in Scarborough, Perth, in the U13s, Summer Morgan came 15th in the surf race and 19th in the iron, while in the U14s, Jas Hume came 5th in the long run, 16th in the surf race and 17th in the iron. In the U15s, Ellie Morgan made the U15 board and iron semi-finals, and Charlotte Mead made the semi-final of the surf race. Ellie and Jas came 5th in the 2x1km run. Jas, Summer and Emily Thomas came 12th in the board relay final, and Charlotte, Ellie, Emily and Jas came 9th in the surf teams final. The Aussies was a great experience for our youth girls who represented the Club with immense effort and club pride.

Jas Hume and Fergus Spinks attended the Champion Lifesaver Day at Life Saving Victoria where members from different clubs came together to learn about different areas of surf lifesaving. The day included a competition named after former Anglesea and past LSV President, Mike Martin, testing each participants lifesaving skills, knowledge and fitness.

Summer Morgan and Morgan Taylor attended the Life Saving Victoria U13 Development Camp, and Sophia Mazzotta attended the U15 Camp. Very positive feedback was received from each of them. These camps are a great opportunity to develop leadership, interpersonal and teamwork skills while also broadening their understanding of lifesaving.

In 2023, 13 members between their SRC and Bronze years attended a 4-day Gap Year program in mid-January. This program provided the opportunity to refresh first aid, resuscitation and surf skills through fun and immersive experiences and social events. Club member, Rowena Webster, who is a three time Olympian and Olympic bronze medallist, and former Australian water polo team captain, spoke to the group on the opening morning, offering inspiring stories and lessons from her journey through surf lifesaving and elite sport. Paramedic Jacqui Cook and Club Captain Tilly Campbell assisted with some of the training sessions, and I would like to thank Rowena, Jacqui and Tilly for their assistance in this year's program.

A huge thank you to the Supporters Group who once again provided funding for the Youth area of the Club in supporting the Starfish Nipper Program through the Hilton White Estate, the competition team and Summer Program through the Gladys Stott Estate, and the local Nipper program with training and operational expenses. In 2022-23, we were able to purchase a new ski, fibreglass nipper boards including two board rescue boards, full size board rescue malibu's and 2 paddles. The Supporters Group also assisted at the Family Night, setting up/packing up at events and running some much-loved BBQs. I would also like to thank Yvette Morgan who has worked tirelessly in her role as Nipper Team Manager in coordinating entries, water safety, officials and carnival set up and pack up workers. She has done a magnificent job over the past 3 years and will be stepping down from this position for 2023-24.

The 2023-24 season is already approaching, and I would like to encourage each parent to consider how they can contribute to the youth area of the Club, to continue to support our children in their development and growth into future lifesavers. NIPPER

REPORT

Season 2022/ 2023 was a brilliant season for the Anglesea Surf Lifesaving Club Nippers program. Taking over from Matt Keenan at the helm, initially I was quite apprehensive with the task of being asked to be the Big Nipper, however I was incredibly proud that the Club entrusted me to do the role well. Had it not been for members such as Matt, Naant, Sam, Ivor, Matt T etc, I would not have accepted the role. The Club should be proud and acknowledge the wealth of knowledge, talent, and positive attitude, these core members show. The hours allocated to the club during their holiday's is extraordinary.

We had 402 Nipper registrations, 22 Starfish Nippers and 40 SRC registrations for the 2022/2023 season. There were new LSV registrations criteria for Age Group managers which essentially meant a stricter credentialing process for members to be AGM/AGL. Having started the process of allocating AGM/AGL back in February 2022, I was very comfortable with the calibre and number of members offering up their leadership.

As a per capita club, our results in the competitive sense are remarkable. At the competitions, we had excellent results which the Club needs to continue to recognise. This was largely driven by the coaches, whom Ivor and Yvette Morgan are integral to leading.

The participant survey results are very pleasing. Three points to highlight are:

1. 75% of participants ranked the program 'most favourable'.
2. 85% of participants ranked their growth in confidence as 'most favourable'.
3. 90% of participants would recommend the program as 'most favourable'.

Overall, the results are brilliant, and I am happy with the results. There are perhaps two points I took from the results:

1. Potentially a need for more surf education, (how to read a rip etc).
 - Surf Education. Many of the Age Group Managers and Leaders are parents with limited surf experience and whilst they are very willing and able to help, they may not have experience on rip recognition etc. I would welcome a voluntary session(s) outside of nippers where an experienced leader could pass on some education.
2. More use of the Club rooms socially.
 - Looking forward, we will continue to create and deliver social opportunities, both at the Club and the broader community.

To my knowledge, we had one injury, with a board to the face. The child was fine, although did see a medical practitioner.

This year we reintroduced the BBQs which were very popular. My goal was to increase the community feel which, over COVID understandably, took a hit. The snags were all sold out every session, and this was with an increasing supply, hence the demand was there. Not only did this add value to the community but this also added approximately \$6K net profit for the Nippers.

The new boards were well received and respected however we can do with more boards. Some of the older boards are waterlogged and there is a significant difference between the old and the new boards. We alternate between age groups and board access. This is largely due to board availability and the number of boards in the water. It would be great if there is a budget for more boards.

There is an amazing spirit within the greater group of parents. Everyone, if asked, is willing to help. Many don't know where or what they can do to help, hence unless specifically asked, will not put up their hands. However, I have found that simple direction and requests yields favourable responses. There is a great feeling amongst the Nipper group.

A long-lasting question remains. How to keep the kids in the sport once they complete the Nippers program, with competing sports etc. as they get older. I don't have this answer. Having 40 do SRC is a great result and hope to see this continue into next season.

I will put up my hand to run Nippers again this year. The program ran very well with lots of helpers and we are keen to continue to help and support the ASLSC.

I would like to thank Peter Williams, Jennie Mauderer and Raylene Fordham for their help and support, simply superb and always willing.

The 2022/23 season was very successful for the Anglesea Beach team showing improvement after a strong foundational season last year and with many new competitors donning the green and white cap. It was fantastic to have a full calendar of racing with athletes competing in 6 local carnivals as well as State and National championships.

Throughout the year we added several new talented beachies. Julia Phillips and Bella Robinson strengthening our female teams' and contributing to the team's success at Vic's and Aussies. We also had local appearances throughout the season from Max Zicman, Kane Emery, Will Gossan and Alex Shears-Jones. Unfortunately, our Team Captain, Saxon Beale, was ruled out for the entire season by the most innocuous foot injury at the very first carnival.

In early January, Sam Johnson and Cooper Stanley saw their impressive performances in the early rounds of competition pay off and secured themselves a trip to NSW representing Victoria at the Interstate and Summer Surf Series competitions. This saw them pitted up against the top athletes from across Australia in four back-to-back days of full and intense competition. We congratulate these two on their amazing achievements during this time, proving that Anglesea Beachies can take it to the other states.

The Anglesea beach team had a sensational State Championships with every member of the beach team heading home with a medal, this helped push Anglesea into 6th place in the overall club points score. By the end of the weekend the team had won an impressive 12 Gold, 7 Silver & 2 Bronze medals along with many other finalists and placegetters.

Some of the notable performances were:

- the two Open Mixed Beach Relay teams finishing 1st (Kate Walker, Julia Phillips, Sam Johnson, Patrick Kenny) and a very close 4th (Connor Huysing, Cooper Stanley, Bella Robinson, Marli Wilkinson);
 - Kate Walker claiming her 2nd Open Women's Beach Flags title in succession along with 2 gold medals in the relay events and her impressive 2nd place in the Open Women's Beach Sprint;
 - our group of talented junior boys Cooper Stanley, Sam Johnson and Patrick Kenny winning 11 medals between them across both age (U17, U19) & open events which included Patrick Kenny winning both the Open and U19 Men's Beach Flags;
 - Julia Phillips with an outstanding win in the Open Women's Beach Sprint along with wins in the Open Mixed Beach Relay & Open Women's Beach Relay and a bronze medal in the Open Women's Beach Flags;
 - Having 4 competitors in the Open Men's Beach Flags final as well as 5 competitors in the Open Men's Beach Sprint final, and
- of note for the entire weekend was the performance of Mitchell Reither in the U17 & U19 men's beach relay events, with his safe baton changes and steely determination he brought it home for both teams to win gold – the elation on his face (and his dad Kristen) was priceless and gave the team such joy.

After an overwhelmingly successful State Championships, a team of eight Anglesea Beachies and support crew headed across to Perth to test themselves against the highest level of competition, one could ask for. Our competitors were decked out with amazing merchandise thanks to our sponsors Cotton On, looking professional and showing off our wonderful club colours. Our team also received extremely generous sponsorship from Morgan's Financials, who assisted us with fantastic accommodation (which is always challenging when the Aussies are in Perth) – thank you so much to Jill Murray in organising this.

In summary, the team enjoyed their most successful Aussies in over 25 years by having 8 finalists – in all age groups, both male & female and in both teams' & individual events. Of recognition must be to our two medal winning performances:

Patrick Kenny – 3rd, U17 Men's Beach Sprint, and

Julia Phillips, Cooper Stanley, Kate Walker, Patrick Kenny – 3rd, Open Mixed Beach Relay.

It must be said that our sprinters led the way over the 3 days of competition:

Julia Phillips – was certainly one of the favourites for the Open Women's Beach Sprint after winning each of the heat, quarter and semi with blistering runs in each. The hotly contested final saw Julia crowned as the 4th fastest beach sprinter in Australia which is an unbelievable feat. This together with her Bronze medal as part of the Open Mixed Beach Relay and along with her teammates Bella Robinson, Kate Walker and Stephanie Larkin finishing an amazing 6th in the Open Women's Beach Relay. Julia's improvement after joining the Anglesea beach team has been amazing for everyone involved and we can't wait to see what she does next year

Kate Walker- whilst we know Kate for her strength in flags, Kate blitzed the soft sand in career best sprinting form which secured her first ever Open sprint semi-final and ranking her in the top 12 in Australia. Like Julia, Kate was also an integral team member of the successful Mixed Beach Relay and Open Women's Beach Relay teams.

Cooper Stanley – as a first year U19 and having concentrated on school swimming for much of the year, Cooper’s performance by making the final of the U19 Men’s Beach Sprint, where he finished 8th, was one of the most outstanding achievements of the season. Cooper made 3 finals at the Australian Championships – 8th U19 Men’s Beach relay, 3rd Open Mixed Relay and 5th U19 Men’s Beach Relay (together with Sam Johnson, Patrick Kenny and Pierre Lee, although the team were unfortunately disqualified) – well done Cooper on an amazing weekend, all that training and dedication certainly paid off.

Patrick Kenny – also made 3 finals over the weekend, both in individual and team events and claimed 2 Bronze medals- a 3rd in a highly contested U17 Men’s Beach Sprint and as a team member in the Open Mixed Beach Relay. Patrick was also a member in the U19 Men’s Beach Relay team who made the final and was all so very close to making the U17 Men’s Beach Flags final but missed out by one spot, being eliminated in the very last run of the semi-final.

Sam Johnson – it was amazing to have Anglesea represented in so many finals at the beach sprint track, and no more so than when we had both Patrick and Sam in the final of the U17 Men’s Beach Sprint. Sam’s hard work paid off by also making 3 finals over the weekend that made him the 8th fastest beach sprinter in Australia and 6th best flagger. Making any beach flag final at the Australian Championships is truly an amazing performance, and so Sam, you should be very proud of your achievements over the season.

I am sure the athletes would agree that they could not have had such a successful weekend of competition without the amazing support from Jill Murray, Jill Kenny, Russell Johnson and Robert Kenny. These dedicated group of parents ensured that all team

members (and coaches!) were able to compete at their pre-eminent level: transporting everyone to & from the beach each day, organising and providing dinner each night at our fantastic accommodation, making sure we had all the right gear on the beach (those chairs were a god send!), etc, etc. Not only do the beach competitors thank you but the entire membership of the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club congratulates you for your devotion to what we all love – Surf Life Saving.

Congratulations must go to Sam Johnson who won the Bruce Thompson Award this season as well as the Margaret Worrell Award – a tremendous effort by Sam and reward for your consistency over the season.

Overall, this season was a massive success with too many amazing moments to count. One thing that can be said for certain, is that the improvement athletes have shown was incredible with so many career firsts for athletes both young and senior. None of this would have been achieved without the amazing guidance of Peter Van Miltenburg and John Baldock – we certainly missed you John at the Aussies this year. The team is so fortunate to be under the guidance of these talented coaches. We will forever be in debt to them for all their time and effort that they dedicate to us. Without them the Anglesea Beach team would not have had the success this year, that they did. In fact, without them there wouldn’t be a beach team at all. I’d also again like to thank our sponsors Morgans Financials and Cotton On for helping our athletes achieve the success they did. Well done to everyone this season, you’ve made the Club extremely proud.

On four separate occasions, the crew travelled to Dee Why which meant return flights and the round trip towing the boat, all self-funded, by each individual crew member. Clancy Luscombe won the men's 2.5km event at the start of the day with a time of 00:29:50 by one second to the 2021 2.5km winner Matt Gilling (00:29:51) with Harry Manolopoulos (00:29:52) in third place. In the women's 2.5km event, Clare Milligan backed up from her 2021 win to take out the event in 2022 in 00:34:45. Sofia Piaia (00:35:45) was second and three-time Olympian Rowie Webster (00:35:41) finished in third.

Harvey Luscombe was the men's winner of the 600m event with a time of 00:08:43 and Zoe McKenna was the female winner with a time of 00:09:14.

The 1.2km event, Thomas Hay was the open male winner with a time of 00:14:30, with second place tied between Clancy Luscombe (00:14:45) and the 2021 winner Matt Gilling (00:14:45). Mia Holah was the open female winner with a time of 00:16:30. Like the male category, second was also tied with Madison Cooper (00:16:34) and Anglesea SLSC's own Naantali Marshall (00:16:34).

Race Director, Tom Cullen said "Swimmers enjoyed the calm sea conditions which were experienced by all. Whether this was your first-time swimming in an ocean swim, or you were a seasoned swimmer, everyone had a great day."

The Burson Rock2Ramp Ocean Swim would like to thank everyone that attended and supported the event with much needed funds going to the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club, to ensure we can continue to provide essential rescue services to the Anglesea community and visitors.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

In the trustee's opinion, the Incorporated Association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist uses of the financial report who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. This special purpose financial report has been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of *AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements*, *AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows*, *AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors* and *AASB1054 Australian Additional Disclosures*.

The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Inventories acquired at no cost or for nominal consideration are measured at the current replacement cost as at the date of acquisition.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is initially recorded at the cost of acquisition less, if applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. The plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure that the carrying amount is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the utilisation of the assets and the subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in estimating recoverable amounts.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables, including distributions receivable, are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the association that remain unpaid at 30 April 2023. Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. They are subject to normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Revenue from the rendering of services is recognised upon the delivery of the services to customers.

Revenue from commissions is recognised upon delivery of services to customers.
Revenue from interest is recognised using the effective interest rate method.
Revenue from dividends is recognised when the entity has a right to receive the dividend.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Goods and Services Tax

Transactions are recognised net of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

Employee Provisions

Short-term employee benefits

Provision is made for the association's obligation for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Current employee provisions are those which employees are currently entitled to and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Non-current employee provisions are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. The expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, experience or employee departures and periods of service, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on high quality corporate bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the timing of the estimated future cash outflows.

The association's obligations for current employee benefits such as wages, salaries and sick leave are recognised as part of accounts payable and other payables in the statement of financial position.

Contributions are made by the entity to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when the entity receives the grant, when it is probable that the entity will receive the economic benefits of the grant and the amount can be reliably measured.

If the grant has conditions attached which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the grant, the recognition of the revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Where the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value back to the grant contributor, the transaction is considered a reciprocal transaction and the revenue is recognised as a liability in the balance sheet until the required service has been completed, otherwise the income is recognised on receipt.

Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club Inc receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for a nominal or zero value. These assets are recognised at their fair value on the date of acquisition in the balance sheet, with an equivalent amount of income recognised in the income statement.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Government Grants

Government grants received are recognised in the income statement when the entity receives the grant, when it is probable that the entity will receive the economic benefits of the grant and the amount can be reliably measured.

2. Resilience Fund

During the current financial year the club launched the 'Resilience Fund' with the ambition of raising a total of \$1,000,000 over 10 years.

The fund has been established to ensure the Club has the appropriate resources, infrastructure and equipment to keep our beaches safe. Additionally, the fund will support the Club to continue be a great community leader and to provide safe avenues for our membership to learn beach and life skills, compete and/or participate in the running of our Club.



Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the financial report of Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club Inc. ('the Association') which comprises the Statement of Financial Position as at 30th April 2023, Trading Statement, Statement of Profit and Loss, Statement of Cash Flows and Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended 30th April 2023, Notes to the Financial Statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the Financial Declaration of the Committee.

In my opinion, except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of this report, the accompanying financial report presents fairly, in all material aspects, the financial position of the Association as at 30th April 2023, and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements and the requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (Victoria)*.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

I did not attend the year-end stock take and was unable to perform alternative procedures to gain reasonable assurance over the balance of inventory held at 30th April 2023.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of my report. I am independent of the Association in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to my audit of the financial report in Australia. I have also fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

I draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Committee Member's financial reporting

responsibilities under the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (Victoria)*. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of the Members of the Committee

The committee is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (Victoria)* and for such internal control as the committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the committee is responsible for assessing the association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the committee either intend to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

In the trustee's opinion, the Foundation is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist uses of the financial report who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. This special purpose financial report has been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of *AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements*, *AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows*, *AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors* and *AASB1054 Australian Additional Disclosures*

The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

Material Uncertainty Related to Going Concern

The directors have considered going concern and believe the company can continue as a going concern. However, attention should be drawn to the directors consideration of ceasing operations in the next 12 months. This consideration is not as a result of the foundation being unable to realise its assets, or discharge its liabilities, in the normal course of business. The consideration is given simply as a means of simplifying the financial affairs of the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club.

Discussions around ceasing operations are ongoing and a decision will be made in the near future.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables, including distributions receivable, are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

Financial Assets

Investments held are originally recognised at cost, which includes transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at fair value which is equivalent to their market bid price at the end of the reporting period. Movements in fair value are recognised through an equity reserve.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company that remain unpaid at 30 April 2023. Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. They are subject to normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation resulting from past events, for which it is probable that there will be an outflow of economic benefits and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured using the best estimate available of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the entity and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue from interest is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Revenue from dividends is recognised when the entity has a right to receive the dividend.



Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Unmodified Opinion
