President's Report

It has been another big year for the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club. Thank you to all members, sponsors and supporters for making 2017/2018 a success. As my second year as President ends we are well into planning for the next. Recently Surf Life Saving Australia (SLSA) President Graham Ford AM, wrote "We could all be forgiven for thinking that what used to be called the 'off-season' for most of Australia is a thing of the past." The Club is a 365-day operation these days and we cannot continue to see ourselves as a summer Club only or have a 'season only' mentality. Many people are working all year-round to run our great Club, whilst continuing to provide opportunities in surf sports, education and training for our members and call-out emergency services to the community.

As a Club we need to constantly evolve and try new things to improve our Club. We recognise that any change can be disruptive and can, on occasion, cause inconvenience for members. We keep this in mind with all of the planned activities. However, to grow and improve what we do, we have to continue to try, even if don't get the result we were hoping for, and most importantly, learn from this.

We have achieved a lot over the past 12 months throughout all the facets of our operations, including Administration, Surf Sports, Member Development, Rescue Services, Nippers and in the community. Thank you to all Club leaders, helpers and supporters for making this happen.

Clubhouse Redevelopment

The Building Redevelopment project has continued to take shape under the leadership of Peter Williams and his team. Pleasingly, we have raised a significant amount of money from current and past members, thanks in no small part to our Fundraising Chair, Ingilby Dickson. Ingilby informs me that contributions by our members as a portion of the project will make up more of the funding mix than most other lifesaving clubs, so I sincerely thank all who have donated to date. Thank you also to our project partners, PDS Group, Michael Carr Architects, BSGM Consulting Building Surveyors and Maddocks for your ongoing support.

The reality is we are still short of our fundraising goal and are working hard with all our stakeholders to close the gap, particularly in the lead up to the State and Federal Elections for this 'once in fifty-years' project that will benefit the next generation of ASLSC members and the Anglesea community. If you know anyone who could assist us financially please contact Ingilby who is keen to hear from you.

Patrols and Anglesea Surf Rescue

Thank you to our Patrol Captains and Anglesea Surf Rescue (ASR) teams for the season. We have had another successful patrol season on the beach ensuring we have kept the Anglesea Community and visitors safe. We need to strive to have members that can provide services across the full patrolling season, not just the peak summer holiday period. As one of the largest clubs in the State and one

that has qualified a high number of bronze candidates, it is embarrassing when we are unable to field full patrols in the shoulder periods of the season. We need to work harder to educate members, that our Club operates more than just in the December/January period. We need to continually evolve and make changes to the way we operate so that we can ensure that we are providing the necessary services to the beach going public.

Surf Sports

Following separation from Mentone Life Saving Club, this year was our first season on our own for many years and we focussed on rebuilding Anglesea's Surf Sports team. After a year off, Anglesea hosted a Senior Carnival on its beach with 26 competitors donning the green hoops on the day, including our own Club Captain, Hugh Moodie who amazingly won a pennant in the beach area! Thank you to John Worrell and the Supporters Club for covering the entry fees of all Anglesea competitors for our carnival.

The Rescue and Resuscitation (R&R) Team continued their dominance coming away with impressive results throughout the competition season. The pinnacle was the U19 Mixed 5 Person R&R team, the '*Anglesea Cheeky Devils*' winning gold at the Australian Championships in Perth. Other impressive results were Saxon Beale coming home with silver in the U19 Men's Beach Flags, Ingilby Dickson's results in the Masters' and Max Mauderer's fourth place in the U15 Male Beach Flags in the Youth Championships. Well done to all who competed and helped this season.

Anglesea SLSC's late member, coach, mentor and friend, Geoff Waters, was awarded a posthumous medal of the Order of Australia in the General Division, for service to Surf Life Saving, in the 2018 Queen's Birthday honours. The Club is very proud of Geoff's contribution to our Club and Surf Life Saving.

Surf Sport has a long history in our Club and your feedback via the Membership Survey has highlighted that it is an important area for us to focus on in future. We have a lot to be excited about as we move forward. The appointment of Kate Walker as Surf Sports Director and our new Dolphins Coach, James 'Jamo' Porter is just the start of the rebuild.

Captain Moonlite

Captain Moonlite continues to provide significant value to the Club. Along with the financial benefits, Matt, Gemma and the team have continued to promote the Club positively to the community whilst providing numerous job opportunities for residents. Congratulations to Captain Moonlite on their continued culinary successes.

Marketing & Communications

It has been a pleasure to welcome a number of new faces to the Club's management. Kate Paterson and Tanya Devine bring with them many years of experience in marketing



and communications. The membership told us through the recent member survey, that we need to improve member communication. Kate and Tanya will be leading the way to address many of these issues, while also driving a number of new programs and initiatives to increase revenue and participation.

Membership recognition and development

I was pleased to witness the elevation of two of my mentors and friends, Matthew Symington and Chris Porter to Life Membership at last years' Annual General Meeting. I wish to congratulate them on their achievement and thank them for their ongoing support.

Member Development continued to be a busy area again this year. Thank you to all the trainers and assessors who assisted throughout. Many of our trainers and assessors are highly active throughout the Club in patrols, Nippers, competition and assisting with running the Club. It is important that we spread our activities across a greater proportion of the year, compared to just the December/January period, and deliver programs in a sustainable way to reduce the level of volunteer burnout that has occurred over recent years. We also need to ensure that we continue to deliver safe and effective programs. We need to deliver programs which minimise risk to members involved and the Club. Over the past few years we have reduced the number of candidates on our camps to reflect this. The benefit of this approach also allows us to focus on higher quality training and candidate outcomes compared to managing the logistics of significantly large numbers.

Following the end of the season we have restructured the Member Development area to improve the effectiveness of this vital portfolio. We welcome Matthew Taylor to the Director position to help realise our goals.

The club was excited for Phoebe Mitchetti who was selected to attend the Surf Life Saving Australia National Leadership College early in 2018 in Sydney. This was a once in a life-time experience for Phoebe who was exposed to some amazing experiences which will assist with her development as a Club leader and person. Phoebe is an up and coming senior leader within the Club.

A new initiative, led by our Club Captain Hugh Moodie, was a presence at the Anglesea river-side community markets. These markets provided an opportunity for the Club to interact with the community and visitors whilst also providing information about our various programs and services. Well done Hugh.

The Youth Development team continues to be a well-oiled machine. The Nipper, Youth Involvement Program (YIPS) and Starfish programs have continued as some of our most successful programs. Thank you to Naomi Symington, Fiona Fitzgerald, Jess Handreck and Janet Jones. Thank you also to all the Nipper parents, water safety officers and age group leaders for making the programs the success that they are.

Club Operations

The Board has again focused on improving our governance and risk management. Thank you to Chris Foley for your leadership in this area with the support of the Governance Advisory Committee and Finance Risk Advisory Committee. This has included the rollout of a recent Anglesea SLSC Governance Charter, which is aligned with Life Saving Victoria, which sets out the roles, responsibilities, structure and processes of the Anglesea SLSC Board. This Charter also sets out the processes adopted by the Club and its Board in order to develop, implement and maintain a culture and standard of good corporate governance for both internal and external stakeholders.

To our staff, Jaci Chin-Jewson, Jennie Mauderer, Steve Bullock and recent appointee, Tanya Devine, thank you for your contribution to the Club with your tireless work behind the scenes. Thank you to all the Directors, Club Leaders, members, supporters and sponsors for all your work. There are many members that, whilst they don't hold official positions, do many thankless jobs behind the scenes. Thank you to you all.

Club Patrons

Many members may not know who our Club Patrons are, or their purpose. The Patrons are senior members of the Club who through their significant business experience may be able to provide advice and/or financial support at the request of the Board. The current Patrons are John Worrell OAM, Garry Johnson, Frank Herd, Robert Harding, Ian Begley, Geoffrey Inman and Anne Ramsden. I would like to acknowledge Elizabeth Foster who stepped down as a Patron last year for your service to the Club and thank all Patrons' past and present for your valuable contribution to the club.

Leadership Team

Vice President - Operations

This year has focused on implementing the governance changes that we adopted in 2016/17, refreshing our approach to member communication and engagement, and resourcing our marketing and grants program activities.

In response to your feedback, it was clear that we need to improve our communication with members, beyond the website we updated in 2016 and the email bulletins and newsletters. We have created and now produce and mail out to all members, a quarterly hard copy of Green & White. The content aims to be engaging, relevant and is supported by colour illustrations and photos.

In addition to mailing this broadsheet to all members, the December Christmas edition of Green & White is letter box dropped to all properties in Anglesea, with the aim of promoting the upcoming Club activities and to enhance our engagement with the entire local community.

These tactical activities have recently been complemented by the appointment of Kate Patterson to the Marketing Director's role on our board. Kate now resides in Anglesea and brings to the Club executive experience with includes leading Netball Australia's marketing and major international events programs. We have also appointed Tanya Devine as a part time Fundraising, Partnerships and Communications Officer to identify and secure grants, events and sponsorships while further improving our communications with members and stakeholders and marketing of the club.

To ensure the board are focused on the things that matter most to members, we have initiated an annual member survey, akin to an annual 'health check'. This survey aimed to measure your satisfaction with and loyalty to the Club. Additionally, the survey explored and asked members to rank and prioritise many issues. Given the insights and 'reality check' that the survey provided, the board is committed to undertaking the process on an annual basis.

One of the governance initiatives completed last year was the development of key principles which the board adopted and committed to abide by. Board's performance against these Principles, has been reviewed with the results noted below. Further to this, I would like to acknowledge and thank the members of our Governance and Finance Committees who continue to be available and willing to share their wisdom, insight and experience.

Principle #1 : Roles and responsibilities

Description : There should be clarity regarding individual director responsibilities, organisational expectations of directors and the role of the board. This is supported by clear and current bylaws.

Status : Compliant, as indicated by the following :

Roles reviewed and amended during this period include:

- Vice President Life Saving
- Marketing Director
- Rescue Services Director
- Member Development Director
- Surf Sports Director

Principle #2 : Board and management committee composition

Description : ASLSC's organisation leadership (Board and Committee members) needs to consist of people with a mix of the right skills and experience. Consideration will be given to how the addition of an individual builds the collective capability and effective functioning of the Board and Committees.

Status : Compliant.

Principle #3 : Purpose and strategy

Description : The board is responsible for setting the vision, purpose and strategies of the organisation, helping the organisation understand these and adapting the direction or plans as appropriate. This is documented in ASLSC's Strategic Plan and reviewed and updated regularly.

Status : Compliant, as indicated by the following :

- Completed a strategic and operational review of club activities against ASLSC's Strategic Plan in March 2018 involving 20 senior leaders from across all sections of the club.

Principle #4 : Risk recognition and management

Description : By putting in place an appropriate system of risk oversight and internal controls, the board can help increase the likelihood that ASLSC will deliver on its purpose.

Status : Compliant, as indicated by the following :

- Annual risk review and workshop involving Board and club leaders.
- Each board meeting starts with a discussion and documentation of recent risk events/issues.

Principle #5 : Organisational performance

Description : Anglesea SLSC will develop and use appropriate performance categories and indicators to assess progress at delivering on its purpose.

Status : Compliant, as indicated by the following :

- Initiated and completed a Satisfaction, Loyalty & Issues Survey. Which was completed by 200 members of all ages.
- Financial audit review completed and tabled.

Principle #6 : Board effectiveness

Description : ASLSC's board effectiveness will be enhanced through: careful forward planning of board-related activities; board meetings being run in an efficient manner; regular assessments of board performance; having a board succession plan; and the effective use of sub-committees, where appropriate.

Status : Compliant, as indicated by the following :

- Completed a strategic and operational review of club activities against ASLSC's Strategic Plan in March 2018 involving 20 senior leaders from across all sections of the club.
- Initiated and completed the clubs member survey which was completed by 200 members of all ages. Results included:
- 45.5% of members are very satisfied and 35.4% are satisfied

- 41% of members are highly likely and a further 41% are likely to promote ASLSC to friends/family (those highly likely scored ASLSC nine or 10 out of 10 while those likely scored the club seven or eight out of 10.

- Insights and ranking of issues that members rate as being most in need of being fixed/addressed.

- Effectiveness and preference for various communication channels and tools.

Principle #7 : Integrity and accountability

Description : It is important that the board have in place a system whereby: there is a flow of information to the board that aids decision-making; there is transparency and accountability to external stakeholders; and the integrity of financial statements and other key information is safeguarded.

Status : Compliant, as indicated by the following :

- Full independent Audit initiated and completed in June 2018. This exceeds ASLSC's accounting and reporting requirements as a registered not-for-profit organisation.

- Review of Expenditure Policy

Principle #8 : Organisation building

Description : The board has a role to play in enhancing the capacity, capabilities and culture of ASLSC and its members.

Status : Compliant, as indicated by the following :

- Initiation of a new annual member survey to solicit feedback
- Redesign and restructure of ASLSC's Member Development Program
- Development and adoption of new club policies including:
- Social Media Policy
- Claiming Travel Expenses Policy
- Mobile Device Policy

Principle #9 : Culture and ethics

Description : The board sets the tone for ethical and responsible decision-making throughout the organisation

Status : Compliant, as indicated by the following :

- Initiated the Clubs member survey which was completed by 200 members of all ages.

- Governance and Finance Committees in place and available to board for counsel, review and guidance.

- Governance framework in place to support the redevelopment of our clubhouse.

Principle #10 : Engagement

Description: The board helps ASLSC to engage effectively with stakeholders.

Status : Compliant, as indicated by the following :

- Initiated quarterly production and distribution of the Green & White Broadsheet via letter box to all Anglesea residences in December, mailed to all members and circulated to local businesses and agencies.

- Joined the Anglesea Community Network

- Established a physical presence at community markets held on the Anglesea River over summer and at the Anglesea Primary School event.

- Hosted a roundtable discussion within Victoria's aquatic safety industry for the Hon Matthew Thistlewaite, Federal Labour MP charged with drafting a policy paper on water safety for the upcoming Federal election.

- Secured \$500k grant from the Federal Government to support new job creation through ASLSC's clubhouse redevelopment.

- Conducted meeting with Country Fire Authority and Surf Coast Shire on fire prevention and the role that the club could play in a bushfire.

- Regular communication with Great Ocean Road Coastal Committee on beach environment issues.

It is important to recognise the work undertaken by Matt during his time in the role and his invaluable contribution to the Club's operations.

No matter what may be happening at the Club, that can influence the short term direction of our focus, as there are hot issues that regularly surface, we must always revert to our key purpose, and as documented in the Club's Strategic Plan, that purpose is :

"To provide a safe aquatic environment in the Anglesea region by providing best practice lifesaving and first aid services to the community"

This is a very simple statement, but one that is not quite as simple to deliver on, as we can easily be swamped under the ever increasing mountains of work.

Irrespective of our individual drivers to partake in life saving, importantly, we all come together as members of the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club. The member on the beach in red and yellow exists as a result of the tremendous work of many other members and sections of the Club ranging from :

- fund raising, purchasing and maintaining equipment to
- training and skills assessment programs through to
- ensuring the premises are maintained to provide storage and first aid facilities in order to
- support activities that encourage new and future members whilst
- developing a team culture whilst encouraging health and fitness and finally
- increasing surf awareness and water safety for our community

An unbelievable maze of activities and passionate people are working hard to ensure we have the red and yellow on our beach. Whilst all of this is chugging away each of us can be very proud that we are also building great Australians. This is one of the key mantras of SLSC.

I am sure we all, at some time, question how could this possibly work....but it does.

It works because it has to, as what we are doing is critical and it MUST continue.

Season 2017 /18 was a real challenge and thanks to an army of devoted Anglesea SLSC members we achieved many of our objectives. In most of the sections of Life Saving the directors role was vacant for the whole or part of the season. I would like to recognise some of the leaders and drivers that contributed above and beyond in a very challenging year.

Youth Development – lead by Naomi Symington as director and ably supported by 'Big Nipper' Fiona Fitzgerald and our 'Starfish' leader Janet Jones.

Member Development – led for part of the year by Mieke Foster as director and supported by Mike Martin AM as chief assessor, Adam Schaub and Phoebe Michetti leaders of this year's development camp along with many other members contributing to our training and assessment needs.

Surf Rescue - Jack Fry as director for part of the year and coordination of patrol activities by Emily King and Lloyd Simpson, as our long standing first aid officer.

Surf Sports – although the director's role and team manager positions were vacant, Adam Martin managed and coordinated the beach team, Warren Clarke was the unofficial leader of the R & R teams and Scott Penning was Boat Captain. All achieved tremendous success in their own right, with what is probably one of our smallest Club competition teams that I can remember. Administration Report

This is my first report as the Director of Administration for the Club, and as I write this I am reflecting on the wide range of new experiences that I have had, and the far deeper appreciation of the all the time, energy and enthusiasm that so many of the members, staff and office bearers in the Club contribute to the running of the 'business' of the Club.

My role has been relatively simple this year due to the number of the key initiatives that Ingilby Dickson implemented over the past few years, the key highlights over the past year include :

- The change of the administration accounting software to Xero, together with Jaci's diligent attention to detail, has enabled our monthly accounting processes to run efficiently and provide accurate data for our monthly Board meetings.

- The accounting support provided by the staff at West Carr & Harvey has been invaluable and I would like to thank Richard Carr's team for their advice and guidance as we continue to improve the reporting functions.

- Our banking relationships have been simplified this year and the support from the local branch of the Bendigo Bank continues to be of significant value to the Club, both from ease of use and from the grants provides back to the Club. I would encourage all members to consider using the Bendigo Bank and please ensure the bank knows that you are a member of the Club, as this directly drives the size of the grants delivered back to the Club.

- Working with Gemma and Matt, the operators of *Captain Moonlite*, has been a positive experience and we continue to work on delivering value to the Club members and the wider community. The success of their business directly and significantly benefits the financial position of our Club, adding over \$56,000 to our revenue, which will enable us to continue to invest in improvements to our facilities and services.

- The Club shop, under Tina Kay's leadership, has continued to deliver great service to our members and also a significant financial contribution with over \$31,000 of cash generated this year as stock levels were reduced. We are currently investigating the option of adding an on-line shop that will enable improved purchasing access and delivery to your home of our broad range of Club clothing and merchandise. We are confident that this type of additional service will simplify shopping during the busy run up to the Christmas and Nipper season. A special thanks to Tina for her many years of contribution running the Club shop.

- The production of this annual report is a significant task to complete, and I would like to thank Prue Weber for her guidance and tireless attention to detail which is critical for this process. The report has been a very useful promotional tool as we pursue new sponsors, government grants and private donations for the redevelopment project.

- The annual fund raising DoorKnock event was a major challenge this year due to the extremely hot weather that we encountered that day. Fortunately the cool change arrived just in time to allow us to activate the dozens of teams of Nippers, members and parents that enable this event to work successfully. In spite of the heat and due to the efforts of a number of key contributors both on the day, and over the next week, the total collected was over \$37,000, a fantastic result. I would like to extend my thanks to Graeme and Prue Weber and their team of 'counters' for taking on the management of the DoorKnock.

- The day to day workload on Jaci Chin-Jewson and Jennie Mauderer has continued to increase compared to previous years, with the peak season administration workload markedly higher due to the retirement of some key volunteers that had previously handled competition enrolments and related LSV reporting.

- The annual Golf Day, which has been a great tradition for over 40 years, was run and won again this year while raising \$8,000 for the Club. The addition of a mini-golf event proved to be a real attraction for the kids and wider family members, we look forward to the running the event again in 2018. Thanks again to Shane Edmonds and Mark Gowans for their terrific efforts in organising this event each year.

Looking forward to the coming season we will be working on the following areas to continue to enhance the positive experience for our members and supporters:

- Working collaboratively with the staff at *Captain Moonlite* to provide enhanced benefits for our members while ensuring the venue continues to be a welcoming and inclusive environment for the local community and visitors to the Surf Coast region.

- We are encouraged that SLSA is currently reviewing the various membership categories that we administer for them, with the hope that the on-line renewal process will be simplified somewhat and that a Social membership category will provide more flexibility for our prospective members and enable us to lift our membership back towards 2,000.

- Expanding the range and ease of purchasing of Club clothing and merchandise.

- Enhanced and more regular communication to our members using conventional and social media channels.

- We are actively investigating the implementation of an electronic membership "card", which could be an app that is downloaded onto your mobile phone. This would significantly simplify the annual renewal process and assist *Captain Moonlite* with delivering discounts to our members for food and beverage purchases, while enabling them to more easily maintain compliance with Victorian Licensing laws.

- With the increasing costs of waste disposal and the difficulty of recycling some wastes from the Club we are actively investigating some novel recycling options to reduce our costs, reduce the smells coming from our organic waste bins and potentially provide a compost to our members.

I would to especially thank Ingilby Dickson, Tom Cullen, Mike Martin, Jaci Chin-Jewson, Jennie Mauderer and Chris Foley for providing great support to me over the past year and I look forward to the next season being enjoyable and productive for all members.

Rescue Services Report

The Club's key strategic priority is to

Create and maintain a safe aquatic environment in the Anglesea region.

Considering all of the range of activities that occurred during the season, it is pleasing to report that this has been achieved again for another year.

In 1997/1998 the Club created Anglesea Surf Rescue (ASR) and this has continued to actively function for the past 20 years. Over this time it has grown and developed. Importantly, through the ASR processes that were developed and implemented, we have delivered the Club's key strategic priority and we will continue to strive to deliver high quality beach management and safety.

The 2017 /18 season kicked off well in advance of the first beach patrol, with the annual gear inspection and preparation of the Club's vital rescue and patrol equipment. This was very successfully completed under Jack Fry's leadership.

Unfortunately Jack elected to step down from his role later in the season, due to his rapidly expanding work commitments. His valuable work and leadership during his time in the director's role prepared the Club in the best possible manner, which enabled the ASR squads to meet our patrol and surf rescue obligations.

A key component of the ASR support capability includes the demanding role of preparing and maintaining the first aid room equipment and consumables. Once again Lloyd Simpson continued in the vital role of First Aid Officer delivering high quality, reliable equipment and supplies from stretchers through to band aids.

To ensure that we had the appropriate team skills on the beach each day, we can thank Emily King. Emily took on the role of Patrol Coordinator which involved scheduling and coordination of patrols on each of the days. The significant amount of work involved in managing this task again demonstrated that the function of providing patrol services requires a high degree of planning, effective communication and personal commitment from the patrollers to deliver continuous, confident and reliable service to our community. Each member involved undertook their role without any intention of receiving recognition. These members demonstrated the true meaning of 'quiet achievers'.

The daily management of the patrol and the beach rests with one key role, the Patrol Captain. This is the most difficult job on the beach, and each of our 8 Captains delivered great results for the season.

During the 2017/18 season we experienced a significant increase in beach visitations compared to other seasons, with over 167,000 visitors to the Anglesea and Pt Roadknight beaches.

This resulted in:

- 3,800 Preventative Actions by patrolling members
- 57 First aid cases of which 7 required hospitalisation
- 17 Rescues, 13 of which occurred at the Pt Roadknight beach

A great job done by all of our lifesavers and life guards.

In addition to our patrol obligations on the Anglesea and Pt Roadknight beaches, the Club in conjunction with LSV and the Fairhaven SLSC, has provided ongoing support to improving water safety management at Urquart Bluff. The support has been in 2 forms :

- By taking a proactive approach and attending the Urquart Bluff beach on days of dangerous rip conditions, and actively warning swimmers who maybe considering entering the water.
- The second is by attending any emergency response request. This has involved rescue and the provision of first aid support. To date this two pronged approach has been very successful.

I take this opportunity to thank all patrolling / life guarding members and the work by the team behind the scenes who are paramount in having the red and yellow flags appear on our beach and surrounding areas.

The Vic Masters at Lorne was the next race and we were represented by our Masters Men rowing as a crew in their second carnival. The gents rowed extremely well through the rounds putting themselves in a great position for a medal in the final. With great conditions the gents rowed out of their skins and finished 3rd behind Fairhaven & Port Campbell in the 240+yr division, well done.

The following day saw the Senior's carnival at Lorne with Anglesea represented in Reserve Men. On home turf Lorne were keen to dominate having two crews entered and with the unknown entry of Seaspray. Flat conditions with small runners saw hotly contested heats with crews scraping for major points to get into the final. Our Reserve Men secured their spot with hard, competitive rowing. The final was going to be a hot, contested final with 3 crews in contention for State Team selection. Anglesea got off to a good start with Seaspray, it was a fight all the way to the finishing line with Seaspray winning the pennant, with our boys in second place and Lorne grabbing third.

As the next carnival was in 2 weeks time, both crews ventured up to Cronulla for the ASRL Open surfboat championships. Waves were big and a little sloppy at times, but this is what all crews dream to race in. Our Masters Men in the 240+yr division were up first. It was 3 rounds of racing with a cut, based on the lowest points. Our Masters Men rowed well in these conditions, pushing themselves and the other crews, but unfortunately were knocked out, not able to progress through. It was then over to the Reserve Men also with 3

round of racing with a cut based on the lowest points. With a couple of races not quite going their way, missing out on the big waves, they were able to find themselves inside the cutoff coming into the last race. It was all or nothing. The lads fought brilliantly finishing in 3rd place but was it enough? They waited around, only to find out that they missed out, on a count back, to make the semis.

Everyone's attention was then on the State Champs in Apollo Bay. Anglesea Reserve Men and Masters Men both represented the Club in Reserve grade with the top 12 going through on points. Conditions were rough with a tail breeze on the way out and a strong head breeze on the way back. Rain came and went all day with a thunderstorm lurking in the background. Very tough conditions to race a State Title. Our Masters Men gave a great showing amongst their juniors and competing well, but unfortunately they did not make it through to the semi and finals. The other Reserve Men's crew raced hard all day finishing up in 1st or 2nd positions in every race, putting them in a great position. The top three places were being fought out by Lorne, Mordialloc and Anglesea. It was an old fashion match race between these crews as the fourth place was 2 waves behind. It was bow to bow in the final, with no crews able to find clear water. All were nearing the line on a little runner, but who had the nerve to go for the line? All 3 crews went hard with no one able to clearly workout who was in what position. It was finally announced Lorne won by a seat and Mordialloc and Anglesea was separated by the smallest of margins. Our Reserve Men taking home bronze in a well fought State Title.

The last carnival of the season was the Aussie Titles in Scarborough. The beach was always going to be tough with a shore dumper and backwash to contend with as well as the expected 'doctor' to blow in. With the tough conditions, all racing was to be concluded on Saturday with Sunday expected to be un-raceable due to a massive storm expecting to hit on Saturday night. That meant very hard cuts to be made. From 44 crews they were going down to the top 24 by end of Friday racing. Three rounds were tough with the lads again finding themselves in a position of missing out. But they rallied in the last race to secure a win, putting them through by 2 points into the elimination final on Saturday. With a day's rest, the lads were ready to take on the top contenders.

The elimination race saw the boys in the worst alley, with all crews previously racing there, being knocked out. That didn't faze them and with a blistering start and leading to the turning can, they were in front and held out to win the elimination final, moving into the minor semi, with their heads up, they were confident. Finding themselves in the middle lane, it was a perfect position to be in.

They raced hard with the top 4 to make it through, knocking out 2 crews. The lads made a poor start and were in the middle of the pack. With the lack of speed into and around the can, it was going to be hard to make it through. They worked the runners but slipped back, it was an uphill battle for the lads. One crew fell off a wave, allowing finally two crews to jostle for the 4th place to make it through. With a late surge on the wave, the Anglesea crew just missed out by a seat to make it to the Major semi. It was a great Aussies with the boys making the top ten finishing the best out of all the Victorian crews that entered.

Well done to all crew members and sweeps. You made it thoroughly enjoyable and a great season. We again punched above our weight as we have done over the last three years.

The R&R section would also like to acknowledge the good will and spirit shown by Williamstown and South Melbourne

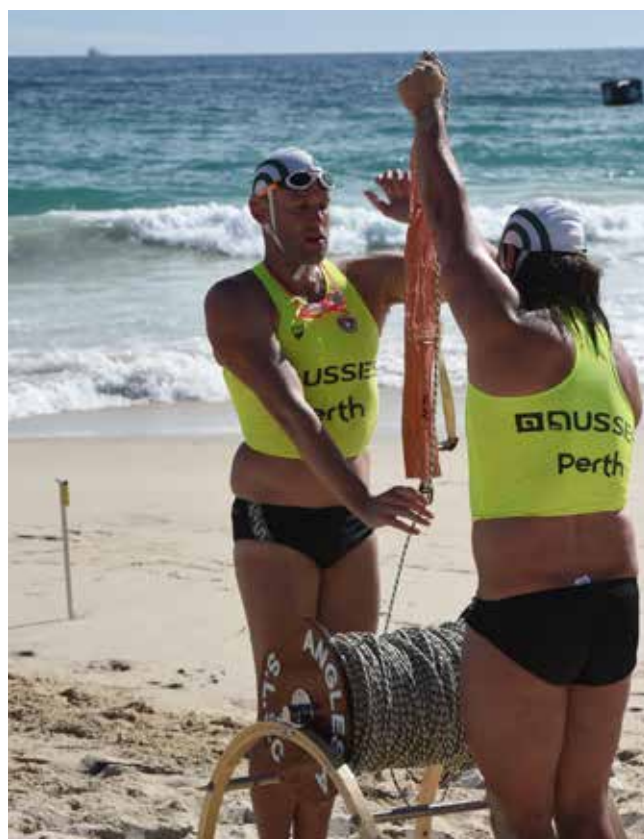
Life Saving Clubs' who have opened their doors when teams have been training in Melbourne.

Development Week

The first major event was Development Week in December, with 60 new 'Bronzies', 12 new Silver IRB Driver trainees and 20 new trainee trainers, all contending with some challenging surf conditions. Guiding these candidates was a team of senior trainers and camp supporters and mentors, ably lead by Adam Schuabe, Phoebe Michetti, Sean McVernon, Alice Bills, Elle Turner and Lachie Eaton.

A focus of this season's camp was on improving water skills. This included daily free water time. One of the highlights of this camp was when a group of senior members including Colin Brodie, Bill Phillips, Mick McConnell, Paul Lunny and Tom Cullen conducted a body surfing session with the candidates. Many of the senior members we believe have already made themselves available for the next camp, they enjoyed it so much.

IRB Program

In addition to the IRB training, and to help improve the candidates surf skills, all participated in a surf lesson thanks to our friends at 'Go Ride a Wave'.

SRC Program : Ingilby Dickson

The SRC program is a key bridging qualification that allows under 14 year old former Nipper participants, that complete the written exam and pass the water and rescue skills assessment, to join a Patrol and to compete in senior carnivals. This was my 12th year leading the course which is run over 8 sessions and 51 young members commenced the course.

We were fortunate to have a great group of SRC candidates this year, who were real "goers" and were prepared to take instruction, work hard and push through their own barriers. One of the highlights of this year was the skill and confidence development of one of the younger participants, who was visiting from Canberra and staying with her grandparents over the summer.

Kimberly was a reasonably competent pool swimmer, but had not swam in open surf conditions before, which she initially found quite challenging. Over the course of the inwater phase of the program we assigned Elise Langford and Freddie Graham to shadow Kim in the water, providing support and guidance as she developed more confidence.

On the final assessment day Kim successfully completed all of the water-based skills tests and achieved a 100% score in the written exam. The positive feedback that the whole SRC training team received from her grandparents after the course was absolutely brilliant and this reinforced why we all enjoy contributing to the development of our younger



members, as it capped off another great SRC program experience for all the trainers involved. All of the above combined to make the 2017/18 SRC programme a very satisfying one for all of us.

I would like to thank Derek Stott and Noel Langford who are the coordinators with myself, and the group were helped by great hands-on tuition from Freddie Graham, Elise Langford, Jacob Shaw, Jessica Handreck, Hamish Neo and Hugh Marslen plus Michael Lombard again, as our guest trainer on the critical OH&S responsibilities that we all have. A special thank you to our two dedicated and well organised admin team of Kate Axup and Jen Douglas, they really made our tasks of keeping track of the young crew much easier.

Assessors Development

One of the unsung heroes of the Member Development area this season (again) was Mike Martin AM. Mike coordinated all the assessments, skills maintenance, re-qual sessions and spent (too) many hours in front of the computer screen processing paperwork. Over the Easter weekend, James Betson led a successful IRB crew persons course. Thank you to the trainers who volunteered their time. Thank you also to Sean McVernon for overseeing IRB training throughout the season.

Finally, the 2017/18 season has been a challenging but rewarding one.

We have welcomed a new group of younger leaders who we hope can continue to progress the Member Development area forward. Facilities Report

During the second half of the year there have been, thankfully, very few significant maintenance requirements around the facilities.

Works completed last year have been operating successfully including 3 phase electrical supply upgrades and replacing some catering equipment that the Club owned.

One area where we would like better solutions is in our waste management and related odour problems. At the height of the summer these issues become very difficult, particularly with *Captain Moonlite's* use of fresh produce which generates more vegetable and animal wastes. We implemented a more costly organic waste collection and pickup service to try and reduce odours. This partially worked, with *Captain Moonlite* staff using the correct bins but unfortunately getting the lower Club member's area to manage this consistently was less than successful, with organic food waste being placed into the dry waste skip on too many occasions.

The organic waste for composting was cleared each Friday while the dry waste skip was cleared fortnightly. Further contributing factors were the public holidays, when at least on two occasions, delayed waste clearing by a further week. At the time of writing this, the Board is investigating onsite composting systems for organic waste which has the potential to reduce our waste removal costs and potentially, the odour issues.

We have engaged Geelong Monitoring Systems as our new security monitoring provider. This was aimed to reduce costs and have reactive service support far closer to the Club. The previous service was operated out of Melbourne and any service calls were quite costly. There have been upgrades to the internal systems and placement of a sensor in the Patrol Shed downstairs as well as in the Office Area and *Captain Moonlite* upstairs. As a warning please note that these areas will be routinely armed.

Thanks to Steve Bullock and Chris Porter, the general club storage areas and our offsite area at Inverloch St have been tidied up to make current storage and planning for the re-development somewhat easier.

I will not be seeking another term as Facilities Director and would like to thank the Board and members for their assistance.

Building Redevelopment

The past 12 months have seen significant progress on this important project and we are starting to get really excited about the potential for getting this redevelopment off the ground.

In November we received confirmation that a planning permit had been issued by Surf Coast Shire. This followed getting Coastal Management Consent in March 2017 and was an important milestone as it gave surety to the project going ahead and followed more than six years of design development, consultation and engagement with government agencies and the community.

With these milestones ticked off our Project Managers, the PDS Group engaged the various specialist design consultants and under the direction of our architects, Michael Carr Architects Pty Ltd, the detailed design is now taking shape. This has entailed some modifications to the original concept design such as relocating the patrol store and public toilets and improving aspects of the internal layout. The architects and consultants are now documenting the detailed design parameters and these are expected to be available by September, together with an updated costing, based on an independent quantity surveyors assessment.

Fund Raising Activities

In parallel with the design works, we have been working hard to improve our funding position. Thanks to lobbying by LSV, Jan Juc SLSC and ourselves, both clubs have received a grant of \$250,000 from the Surf Coast Shire. The Club was also successful in gaining a \$500,000 grant under the Federal Governments Regional Jobs Improvement Program.

We would like to extend a 'Huge Thank You' to the following members and their partners for hosting a number of very successful fund raising functions in their homes over the past year :

These events raised cash and pledges of over \$200,000....a fantastic contribution from the hosts and the guests that attended.

This brings the current funding to \$3.5M inclusive of the \$1.5M previously pledged by the State Government.

We continue to investigate further options to get us to our funding target before going to tender.

Project Governance

Our Project Governance Group is overseeing these processes to ensure the following

- Our members interest's and process transparency are observed and maintained,
- That we conform to the requirements attached to grant funding that has been received,
- That we comply with all relevant legal obligations.

The Project Governance framework identifies a series of Toll Gates, and a key decision point is where we sit financially before going to tender.

Ideally we would like to commence works in early 2019 but that is totally dependent on funding. The Club is budgeting \$5 million which is consistent with the costs of similar surf club redevelopments around the state.

We reiterate our thanks to the Building Committee and to all members for their support to date and look forward to significant progress over the next 12 months.

Preparations had been made, the cooks were in place and the support crew were arriving. Many collection bags had gone out and people arrived to help collect. As expected, some seventeen areas were not able to be covered that evening, but still a reasonable total of over \$26,000 was apparently collected, however the 'money counters' said only \$22,000 was ready for banking.

The next day another \$2,000 was found, due to a typing error in the Excel program. What of the other \$2,000 ? Over the next few days, Jaci, our Office Coordinator, reported that she had never seen so many 'Sorry we missed you' cards arrive, with money attached.

The tally crept up towards \$30,000. Meanwhile the seventeen 'missing' areas were door knocked over the next two weeks and another \$2,000 was collected. While Prue was sorting out the bags and collection boxes a number of weeks later, one box was noticeably heavier, which turned out to be monies collected from an area– the missing \$2,000! Counted but not banked. Since the middle of January the total has crept up to just over \$37,000. A fantastic result !!

We would like to extend the Club's thanks to Rachael Keeble for her five years of running this event, especially her professionalism in developing her data sets. We extend our thanks to the people who helped – Letter box drop-ers, cooks, collection staff, and money counters, and of course to our wonderful Nipper collectors and their parents, and finally Jaci who handled volumes of pledges after the event.

We would appeal to anyone (or a group of people) who would like to take an active part in this volunteer event to contact us or Jaci at the office, especially if they would like to run the DoorKnock.

We would not like to see weather for another DoorKnock like this yearbut the outcome was unbelievably good. We believe this again just demonstrates the high regard the Club has in our community and we thank them for it.

We congratulate and thank Matt, Gemma and the Captain Moonlite team for their ongoing commitment, passion and results!

They say the first year in business is the hardest, and whilst we certainly found it challenging, the second year has proven to be the toughest thus far. Perennial staff shortages, particularly for skilled staff, has put more pressure on the team with Matt and I working on average over 70 hours per week and over 90 hours in the peak summer weeks.

With that being said, there is still good news. After the last AGM we were awarded 'One Chef's Hat' in the National Good Food Guide Awards. We were humbled to have been honoured with the award, in what is arguably the industry's authority on dining out.

Our 'Hat' is the first ever for Anglesea and one of only a handful awarded along the Surf Coast. In addition to the Good Food Guide award, we were also rated Number 65 in Gourmet Traveller Magazine's 2018 Top 100 and number 80 in Delicious Magazine's 100 Most Delicious Victorian Restaurants.

We finished the Ray Marsh Room refurbishment after the AGM last year, which has vastly enhanced the space allowing for more flexible seating arrangements, a space with the custom bar ledge overlooking Point Roadknight. With one full season under our belt we were more prepared for the busy summer however, and even after much effort, we were unable to secure the coffee cart which inevitably put pressure on our team.

However with better staff management and removing larger size coffees from our offering we were able to cope with the demand with improved service efficiency. Our Beach Bar Menu proved to be a success again this summer allowing the kitchen to cater for additional guests when the restaurant was at capacity. We will continue to offer this option during peak and busy times.

John gained SLSA awards for Service, for 25 years in 1982, 50 years in 2003, and 60 years in 2013.

He was a great friend and I will miss the phone calls and dinners that we shared during the past 66 years and we extend to Nola and his family the Club's deepest sympathy.

I hereby present the Annual Financial Statements for the year ending 30 April 2018 for the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club.

We have had a successful year with total revenue of \$905,936, expenses \$512,504 resulting in a net profit of \$393,432. There was a transfer to the Foundation of \$6,600 resulting in a Net Profit after this distribution of \$386,832.

Included in this revenue figure is the sum of \$281,364 representing donation to the surf club for the new redevelopment programme. I also note that the income received from Captain Moonlite was \$56,135.

The other notable items are the proceeds from the Annual Door Knock of \$37,265 also the Net income from the Rock to Ramp of \$28,076.

With regards to the Balance Sheet the figures indicate the Net Equity of the club was \$2,214,311 compared to \$1,827,479 (April 2017).

Over the year the cash reserves have increased from \$248,864 to \$640,870, indicating a very financially sound club.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Jaci and Jenny for their outstanding work in managing the administration of the club.

Goods and Services Tax

Transactions are recognised net of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when the entity receives the grant, when it is probable that the entity will receive the economic benefits of the grant and the amount can be reliably measured.

If the grant has conditions attached which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the grant, the recognition of the revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Where the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value back to the grant contributor, the transaction is considered a reciprocal transaction and the revenue is recognised as a liability in the balance sheet until the required service has been completed, otherwise the income is recognised on receipt.

Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club Inc receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for a nominal or zero value. These assets are recognised at their fair value on the date of acquisition in the balance sheet, with an equivalent amount of income recognised in the income statement.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Government Grants

Government grants received are recognised as revenue on a basis to match the recognition of revenue with costs incurred in the project.

For the year ended 30 April 2018****1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies**

The directors have determined that the company is not a reporting entity and accordingly, this financial report is a special purpose report prepared for the sole purpose of distributing a financial report to members and must not be used for any other purpose. The directors have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and under the historical cost convention, except for certain assets, which, as noted, have been written down to fair value as a result of impairment. Unless otherwise stated, the accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the prior year.

The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Inventories acquired at no cost or for nominal consideration are measured at the current replacement cost as at the date of acquisition.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is initially recorded at the cost of acquisition or fair value less, if applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Plant and equipment that has been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, is valued and recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired. The plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure that the carrying amount is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the utilisation of the assets and the subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in estimating recoverable amounts.

Freehold land and buildings are measured at their fair value, based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by independent external valuers, less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount of land and buildings arising on revaluation are credited in equity to a revaluation surplus. Decreases against previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves in equity. All other decreases are charged to profit or loss.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is offset against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables, including distributions receivable, are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company that remain unpaid at 30 April 2018. Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. They are subject to normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

I communicate with the Members of the Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

The trustees of the Foundation have prepared the financial statements of the Foundation on the basis that the Foundation is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. These financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of beneficiaries, the information needs of stakeholders and for the basis of preparation of the Ancillary Fund Return.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the trustees have determined are appropriate to meet the purposes of preparation. Such accounting policies are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and under the historical cost convention, except for certain assets, which, as noted, have been written down to fair value as a result of impairment. Unless otherwise stated, the accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the prior year.

The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables, including distributions receivable, are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money, if required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

Financial Assets

Investments held are originally recognised at cost, which includes transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at fair value which is equivalent to their market bid price at the end of the reporting period. Movements in fair value are recognised through an equity reserve.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company that remain unpaid at 30 April 2016. Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. They are subject to normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation resulting from past events, for which it is probable that there will be an outflow of economic benefits and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured using the best estimate available of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.
