

ANGLESEA SURF LIFESAVING CLUB



John Graham Worrell OAM 2/4/1928-8/5/2019

John gained an interest in Lifesaving when he joined Brighton LSC in 1944 and soon became active gaining many Royal Life Saving Awards. John and a few RLSSV members gained their SLSA Bronze Medallion (BM) at Torquay (25/1/1947 no 23686) but did not join Torquay SLSC as members.

In 1947 he gained his RLSS Bronze Medallion Instructors Award and later was made Club Chief Instructor until 1951. During this time, he was also the Social Organiser, Club Captain, Club Reel & Line Champion, Belt Champion, Club Champion, 75yds breast stroke Champion and was made a Life Member in 1951. John was an instructor and team member of many Royal Life Saving Interstate Victorian Teams during this time.

John and several Brighton LSC members attended the first meeting to form the Anglesea SLSC in January 1952. They all wore their bottle green blazers, with the white Brighton emblem on the top pocket. They were advised that if they joined Anglesea the club would apply for Bottle Green and White as the Club colours, so there would be no need to buy a new blazer. Fortunately, they all joined.

On joining Anglesea John was intent on seeing the Club progress. He was active on committee for several years. The Club had some good swimmers and in 1957 John invited a few members to his tent in the camping ground and outlined his plans for the future of the Club and which included a championship R&R team. His coaching ambitions were soon rewarded, and his team won the State R&R championship in 1960 and succeeded with further championship wins in years to follow. His leadership during this time was inspirational and he positively affected the lives and characters of many. He taught discipline and respect. His teams went on to produce 6 Club Captains and 2 Presidents.

John's enthusiasm for the Club to succeed continued and in the 1970's he assembled some of his old R&R team members and others to form a March Past team. In those days the March Past was an important event that had never been taken seriously by the Club. John's success was immediate and the team was undefeated in the State for 5 years

John's status as a coach and leader was widely recognized by members of SLSA National Council. In 1971 John was one of a group of elite instructors and coaches to be selected in the first Australian Educational & Instructional Team to tour Asia, visiting Hong Kong, Japan and Taiwan. The team members instructed many locals in all facets of lifesaving, as drownings were common on the many beaches along their coastlines.

As a result of the visit a large number of new lifesaving clubs were established. In 2004 a return visit was made to Taiwan to see the progress made since 1971, with over 60,000 candidates having passed their SLSA BM. All members of the Police Force, Fire Brigade and Army Special Forces must obtain their BM, clearly a big impact was made by the initial team visit, which John was very pleased to see.



John was a Foundation Member of the Anglesea Golf Club from 1954 and decided in 1964 to commence running an ASLSC Golf Day using the local Club facilities. This Annual event was usually held during the winter months to raise much needed funds and provide an opportunity for Club members to get together in the off season. This event still is being run today and has delivered significant funds for the Club.

John's commendations were many. He was Captain of the Club for four years and President for three. He was Best Clubman in 1959 and again in 1963. He was made a Life Member in 1964. He was a recipient of the Australian Sports Medal-2000, SLSA 60 Year Service Award in 2012, was an inductee into the ASLSC Competition Hall of Fame as a member and as well as the first inductee as a Legend in 2012.

Apart from his involvement with his own Club, John was a member of SLSV Board of Examiners and was Deputy Superintendent for 7 years. He was made a Life Member of the Victorian State Centre (now Life Saving Victoria) and a Life Member of the National Association (now Surf Life Saving Australia). In 2017 John received the ultimate honour – Order of Australia Medal for services to Life Saving.

John left a legacy that will be remembered for many years to come.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Welcome to the Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club's 2018-19 Annual Report. It has been another big year for the Club with continued success on many fronts. Thank you to all members, social pass holders, sponsors and supporters for your contribution.

Last August, the Club played host to the Annual Golf Day Fundraiser at the Anglesea Golf Club. Thank you to Mark Gowans, Shane Edmonds and all the helpers for organising another successful event. Thank you also to the Anglesea Golf Club for your continued support of this day.

The peak season commenced with the traditional Bronze camp being delivered in a new format. The camp came back to being based at the Club for the first time in a number of years with a more manageable number of just over 50 new and existing members completing their Bronze. Thank you to Matt Taylor and his team in delivering these revamped and innovative programs.

The 2018 Burson Rock2Ramp Ocean Swim was held on December 28th in near perfect conditions. This major fundraiser was a tremendous success with a new record of 1024 swimmers participating. Not only does this event provide much needed funds to the Club, but it also bolsters tourism to the area which supports local businesses in the region.

The Nipper and Starfish programs had another great season. Thank you to all the parents, water safety and age group leaders for your support and contribution to making these programs so successful and fun for the participants. These programs have been run under the leadership of Fiona Fitzgerald, Naomi Symington, Janet Jones and Rob O'Brien and their personal enthusiasm and contributions have been significant in the success of these activities.

Our Surf Sports area is currently rebuilding from the grass roots up. This will be a long process however the Club is committed to investing in the youth of the Club as well as supporting our existing athletes. We would love to see more middle-aged members strap on the white with green hoops cap and join in as a Master's competitor, no matter your ability. We have to remember that Surf Sports is not all about elite performances, it is open to everyone no matter whether you finish first or last and must be fun!

Congratulations to our State Team representatives, John 'Dibs' Fitzgerald (Youth Team), Marli Wilkinson and Saxon Beale (Senior Team) on their selections. I would also like to congratulate our Australian Surf Life Saving Championships 'Aussies' medallists: Naantali Marshall for her individual medal haul (3 Gold), Sally Cumming (1 Silver and 1 Bronze) and the Women's Beach Relay of Naomi Symington, Sally Cumming, Naantali Marshall and Illona Carson (Silver) in the Masters' competition. In the open competition, congratulations to Marcus Jones (Bronze) and the Under

19's 5 Person R&R team of Kirra Burke, Alexandra Madeley, Rhianna Burke, Stephanie Warmuz and Megan Wyatt (Bronze).

The Club prides itself on providing a safe beach by responsible and vigilant patrolling members. This past season was no different, with our members performing some life-preserving rescues from the very first weekend of patrol. It is disappointing to see the number of drownings in Victoria over the past 12 months and it highlights the important work that surf life saving clubs do in educating members and the community to exercise caution when in and around the water. We need to continue to train and educate people about water safety skills, first aid and how to perform CPR, whilst ensuring that there is adequate supervision and that people understand their current swimming ability. Thank you to all those members who ensure that our beach remains safe.

The Annual DoorKnock fundraiser took place in early January with approximately \$30,000 raised. Thank you to all the helpers for making this fundraiser a success. Thank you also to the team led by Peter Williams.

We have welcomed a number of new staff to the Club over the past 12 months. Grace Bath and Chris Hibbert were appointed in the lead up to the summer months as our Facilities & Support Officers. Their contribution to all operations of the Club has been outstanding. I would also like to thank Tanya Devine who held the part-time role of Fundraising, Partnerships and Communications Officer from May to December 2018. Tanya proved to the Club the need for the role, bringing in significant new funding through sponsorships and grants, as well as improving member communications. It was a pleasure to welcome Jen McIntyre to the revised full-time role of Marketing and Events Officer in January 2019.

The 2018/2019 Season is the last season of the lower clubhouse as we know it. A huge amount of time and thought has gone into ensuring that the plans for the clubhouse redevelopment will accommodate our current and future needs. It will ensure we continue to fulfil our core purpose of delivering essential beach safety and lifesaving services, whilst also providing a hub for all training operations and administrative activities. The new building will have the flexibility to cater for other community and corporate organisations, particularly in the off-peak period. At the time of writing this report, I am pleased to advise that the Club signed a design and construction contract with FourSq in early July and the redevelopment has now commenced. The project will take around 10-12 months to complete.

It would be remiss of me not to acknowledge the tireless work of our Building Redevelopment Committee, led by Peter Williams. Peter's leadership through this project has been significant. I would also like to acknowledge all of the



committee members including Chris Porter, Ingilby Dickson, Noel Langford, Andrew Suttle and Graeme Weber. From the Board, a special mention to Directors Richard Carr and Chris Foley for their support of this project.

After successfully securing a grant towards the completion of a new Strategic Plan for 2020-2025, the Club engaged the Geelong Consulting Group to facilitate this project. The Strategic Plan will guide the Club in the provision of facilities, services and programs that are designed to increase participation and engagements in a sustainable way over the next 5 years. We will continue to engage with all members and social pass holders as we move forward with this project.

At the end of the surf life saving year we bid farewell to a number of leaders of the Club who have contributed significantly. Firstly, to Lloyd Simpson who has been our long-serving First Aid Officer, thank you for your outstanding service in this critical area of the Club for the past 12 years.

Janet Jones is co-founder of the Starfish Nippers program and along with Naomi Symington has been a driving force in the establishment and continued operation of the program. Her contribution to the Club has been outstanding and we wish her well for the future. Fiona Fitzgerald has been the Big Nipper over the past few years. Thank you to Fi for her commitment to the Nipper and Dolphin programs over this period. I would also like to acknowledge outgoing Directors Hugh Moodie, Kate Walker, Paul Lunny and Rob O'Brien for their respective contributions to the Club.

As some leaders stand down, new leaders step up. Welcome to Sam Hume (Director of Youth Development), Matt Angie (First Aid Officer), Barry White (Vice President – Life Saving), Matt Keenan (Big Nipper), Ivor Morgan (Big Dolphin) and Tim Bone (Director of Facilities).

It was a pleasure to honour various members during the season, including:

- Honorary Membership Anne Ramsden, and
- 60 Year Long Service Award Garry Johnson

Toward the end of the year, it was with sadness that we farewelled Club legend, John Worrell OAM. As one of the founding members of the Club, John's support over the years has been unwavering. He will be missed, and our condolences go to Joan and the family.

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VICE PRESIDENT - OPERATIONS

It has been another big year at the operational end of the Club with an increasing focus on the clubhouse redevelopment.

We are fortunate to have a hugely talented and committed team of Directors working across the operational disciplines:

Marketing: Following the on-boarding of Kate Patterson late last season in the role of Marketing Director, there has been a marked improvement in the quantity and effectiveness of our marketing and communication activities.

Finance : On the financial front, we continue to be served by long standing member and competitor, Richard Carr who is our Finance Director and one of the region's leading accountants and business people.

Administration: Our significant administration activities associated with running a not for profit organisation with over 1,500 members have continued to be managed dutifully and effectively by Derek Stott.

Facilities: Please join me in welcoming our recently appointed Facilities Director, Tim Bone. Tim is an active Nipper Parent, Anglesea resident and owner of the BIG4 Anglesea and BIG4 Bellarine Holiday Parks, so he has extensive experience managing public buildings and visitors in seasonal locations.

Strategic Adviser to the Board: Please join me in welcoming our recently appointed Strategic Adviser to the board, Jono Clark. Jono has two children involved in the Club and brings extensive international commercial finance, marketing and retail skills and experience to the Board.

This year we instigated a new House Committee ahead of the redevelopment commencing. Please join me in welcoming and thanking the members of this committee:

The House Committee oversees ASLSC's clubhouse experience for members and guests. This includes:

- 1. Develop and negotiate a contract(s) for the provision of clubhouse food and beverage services and the rental of facilities for member functions that reflect ASLSC members needs and preferences in a commercially sustainable way.
- 2. Monitor member and guest satisfaction with their clubhouse experience (cleanliness, use and cost of space, accessibility, friendliness etc).
- 3. Monitor member and guest satisfaction with the club's food/beverage offer.
- 4. Define and communicate behavior and dress codes to members and guests.
- 5. Monitor behavior and dress codes.
- 6. Monitor the performance of food and beverage contracts (service levels, satisfaction, brand protection & financial outcomes).

Below are the results of our recent review of the Club's governance principles.

ASLSC Governance Principles - Annual Review 2018 - 19

The Board endorsed these governance principles in October 2016, the following is a concise review of the status of compliance to these.

Principle #1: Roles and responsibilities

Description: There should be clarity regarding individual director responsibilities, organisational expectations of directors and the role of the board. This is supported by clear and current bylaws.

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following:

Roles reviewed and amended during this period include:

- VP Life Saving
- Marketing Director
- Rescue Services Director
- Member Development Director
- Surf Sports Director

Principle #2: Board and management committee composition

Description: ASLSC's organisation leadership (Board and Committee members) needs to consist of people with a mix of the right skills and experience. Consideration will be given to how the addition of an individual builds the collective capability and effective functioning of the Board and Committees.

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following with their CVs listed on our web site:

- Tom Cullen: Role President for 3 years
- Chris Foley : Role VP Operations for 3 years
- Barry White: Role VP Lifesaving for less than 12 months
- Hugh Moodie: Role Club Captain for 2 years
- Elise Langford : Role Director Rescue Services for 1 year
- Mike Martin AM: Role Secretary for 4 years
- Richard Carr: Role Director Finance for 7 years
- Kate Walker : Role Director Competition for 18 months
- Matt Taylor : Role Director Member Development for 12 months
- Sam Hume: Role Director Youth Development for less than 12 months
- •Kate Patterson : Role Director Marketing for more than 1 year
- Tim Bone: Role Director Facilities for less than 12 months
- Derek Stott: Role Director Administration for 2 years

Principle #3: Purpose and strategy

Description: The board is responsible for setting the vision, purpose and strategies of the organisation, helping the organisation understand these and adapting the direction or plans as appropriate. This is documented in ASLSC's Strategic Plan and reviewed and updated regularly.

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following:

• Completed a strategic and operational review of Club activities against ASLSC's Strategic Plan in March 2019 involving senior leaders from across all sections of the club.

Principle #4: Risk recognition and management

Description: By putting in place an appropriate system of risk oversight and internal controls, the board can help increase the likelihood that ASLSC will deliver on its purpose.

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following:

- Annual risk review and workshop involving Board and Club leaders.
- Each board meeting starts with a discussion and documentation of recent risk events/issues.

Principle #5: Organisational performance

Description: Anglesea SLSC will develop and use appropriate performance categories and indicators to assess progress at delivering on its purpose.

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following:

- Initiated our second annual member survey to monitor member satisfaction and issues.
- Financial audit review completed and tabled.

Principle #6: Board effectiveness

Description: ASLSC's board effectiveness will be enhanced through: careful forward planning of board-related activities; board meetings being run in an efficient manner; regular assessments of board performance; having a board succession plan; and the effective use of sub-committees, where appropriate.

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following:

- Completed a strategic and operational review of club activities against ASLSC's Strategic Plan in March 2019 involving senior leaders from across all sections of the club.
- Initiated and completed an annual member survey which was completed by 100+ members of all ages.

Principle #7: Integrity and accountability

Description: It is important that the board have in place a system whereby: there is a flow of information to the board that aids decision-making; there is transparency and accountability to external stakeholders; and the integrity of financial statements and other key information is safeguarded.

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following:

- Full independent Audit initiated and completed in June 2019. This exceeds ASLSC's accounting and reporting requirements as a registered not-for-profit organisation.
- Review of Expenditure Policy

Principle #8: Organisation building

Description: The board has a role to play in enhancing the capacity, capabilities and culture of ASLSC and its members.

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following:

- Annual member survey to solicit feedback
- Engaged external consultants to review the clubs five year business plan, capabilities and opportunities.

Principle #9: Culture and ethics

Description: The board sets the tone for ethical and responsible decision-making throughout the organisation

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following:

- Initiated and completed the clubs second annual member survey which was completed by 100+ members of all ages.
- Governance and Finance Committees in place and available to board for counsel, review and guidance.
- Governance framework in place to support the redevelopment of our clubhouse.

Principle #10 : Engagement

Description : The board helps ASLSC to engage effectively with stakeholders.

Status: Compliant, as indicated by the following:

- Quarterly production and distribution of the Green & White Broadsheet via letter box to all Anglesea residences (December), mailed to all members and circulated to local businesses and agencies.
- Secured \$1 million grant from the Federal Government to support ASLSC's clubhouse redevelopment.
- Regular communication with Great Ocean Road Coastal Committee on beach environment issues.

ADMINISTRATION AND FACILITIES REPORT

This is my second season as the Director of Administration for the Club and having a little more knowledge and experience of the tasks and most importantly, who to turn to for sound advice, has made the role easier to manage, and hopefully, I have assisted the team in quickly resolving the issues that surfaced as the year progressed.

As the Director, my responsibility is to ensure that resources and systems are in place to enable the key activities of the Club's front office to function effectively. These include the important roles of greeting and answering Members and visitors' questions, helping with on-line renewals, answering phone calls and responding to emails. All of these activities need to be calmly managed, while helping parents find lost items or their lost children, and while directing maintenance contractors and suppliers to the right locations and checking that their jobs are completed. Clearly a multi-faceted role that requires, skill and patience from our team !!

The effective administration of these day to day operations of the business of the Club are managed by Jaci Chin-Jewson, our Admin Coordinator, and Jaci is very well supported over the peak season and during her vacation breaks by Jennie Mauderer our Admin Assistant.

Jaci and Jennie are now based in our temporary office in the old gym, under Captain Moonlite, until the new building is completed. Jaci's office hours at the Club can be found on our web site if you would like to drop in for a chat, or Jaci can be contacted by phone or email. Please note that we are maintaining a limited stock of swimwear at the Club and a limited range of other Club merchandise until the new season starts up.

In addition to managing the front office functions, Jaci has developed broad knowledge over the past three years in running of all the back office aspects of the role, which encompasses:

- Receipting and banking of incoming funds, including membership renewals and new member fees, competition fees, grants, donations and pledges.
- Payments to key service providers which includes Local, State and Federal Governments, LSV and SLSA, statutory bodies that control liquor licencing and charity related activities when we run tin-rattles, raffles and other fund raising events.
- Payments to numerous services that the Club requires, including water, gas, power, fuel, food, insurances, merchandise, first aid supplies, pest control, cleaning, repairs, phone and web-based telecoms, IT support and waste removal services.
- With our Club's annual revenue approaching \$1M, the efficient and accurate processing of these transactions into our accounting system is a critical function of the role. The external auditing of our annual financial accounts has

confirmed that we manage these processes effectively.

The expert accounting support provided to Jaci and to me by the staff at West Carr & Harvey has been invaluable, and I would again like to thank Richard Carr's team for their advice and guidance as we continue to improve the accounting and internal reporting functions.

Our relationship with the Bendigo Bank continues to be of significant value to the Club, both from ease of use and from the grants provides back to the Club. I would encourage all members to consider using the Bendigo Bank and please ensure the bank staff know that you are a member of the Club, as this directly drives the size of their grants delivered back to the Club.

In addition to the financial aspects of the role, the Admin team invests significant time and effort in assisting our existing Members with their annual renewal process and by guiding new Members through the initial registration processes of membership on SurfGuard, the LSV portal which all Clubs use.

We recognize that the annual membership renewal process can be challenging and the five year renewal of a WWCC (Working with Children Check) can appear to be complex or time consuming. I encourage all Members to review and use the information on the Club website or contact Jaci or Jennie directly if any aspects of the processes appear confusing, as they can quickly guide you through the process to a happy ending !!!

To further encourage involvement with the Club and to provide Member benefits at Captain Moonlite, we introduced a Social Pass option this past season, which was taken up by both local Anglesea residents, short term holiday visitors and the less active Club supporters. We introduced this Pass to provide a simplified entry to enjoying the social side of the Club's facilities, while hoping that it would also encourage users to consider full membership of the Club in future, which then enables full access to changing facilities, training and engagement with competition and social events run by the Club. The Social Pass does not require a WWCC.

Prior to the summer we launched an on-line Club shop, hosted by UA Ghanda, which was intended to provide an additional option for buying Club merchandise. This on-line shopping option was only partially successful and we have learnt a number of valuable lessons from the experience. With the added retail industry expertise of one of our new Board advisors, Jono Clarke, we plan to improve the access, service delivery and quality of our merchandise over the coming seasons. Due to the construction of the new building our old Club Kiosk has been lost for this coming season, so we will be considering some "pop-up" options as an alternative. Please stay tuned to our web site and social media pages for more information, as the season approaches.

Facilities

Maintaining the Club's lower building facilities in a serviceable condition has been a real challenge, as we had to continually evaluate the benefits of spending on significant and needed repairs without really knowing when we would eventually demolish the building.

The state of the changing rooms and the storage areas was a prime example of this dilemma and we thank the Members for their patience and understanding of the conditions experienced over the past season or two.

The next challenge we face is thankfully a shorter-term problem, as we demolish the lower building over this winter and have temporary facilities for the coming summer. There will be some compromises needed as we cope with 500 Nippers, 50 SRC students and numerous Bronze re-quals and other training programs.

We have a Transition Team working on these issues and the work done by Chris Porter to date has been outstanding and we pass on our thanks to him for his leadership and tireless contribution.

The production of this annual report is a significant task to complete, and I would like to thank Prue Weber for her guidance and attention to factual detail, which is critical for this process. The report has been a very useful promotional tool as we pursued new sponsors, government grants and private donations for the redevelopment project, which we have now commenced.

I would like to especially thank Jaci and Jennie, Tom Cullen, Mike Martin, Graeme Weber and Chris Foley for providing great support to me over the past year and I look forward to the 2019/20 season as our new Club building takes shape. It will be a different year with temporary facilities in place, but our beach and the safe waters of Anglesea will continue to be a great place to enjoy, while staying safe in the water.

Jen has continued to build on the strong foundations Tanya set, as well as bringing her own unique style and passion for the Club and its place in the community. Since starting her role in January, Jen has successfully secured over \$10,000 in grant funding, and continued to build on the growth and engagement across all of our communications channels including Facebook, Instagram, the website and the Green and White newsletter. She also planned and delivered the farewell party to our clubhouse on Easter Sunday, which was a beautiful celebration of the personalities and memories which have made the old building a true home for so many years.

Our focus over the winter will be on ensuring that members and the broader community are kept well informed throughout the redevelopment period, while keeping them engaged through the delivery of a number of new and existing social events and activities. We are also excited about contributing and sharing updates on the 2020-25 Strategic Plan, which will guide our efforts in the coming years.

RESCUE SERVICES REPORT

The 2018/19 season saw Anglesea Surf Rescue members provide an ongoing safe aquatic environment through active patrolling, primarily during the peak times, for over 7,300 beach visitors. In addition to our contribution, Lifesaving Victoria funds the cost of manning our beach with paid Lifeguards during the balance of the season. These combined resources ensured that over 48,000 beach visitors were protected this season.

This significant service delivery was largely due to effective pre-season planning, the support of ASR Captains and their teams, lifeguards and the Club members who supported the ASRs on patrol.

Pre-planning for the season commenced with Emily King, our Patrol Co-ordinator, preparing the patrol roster for our ASR teams and ensuring all ASR members had re-qualified in preparation for the season.

Lachie Appleby (Gear Steward) and James Betson (IRB Manager) worked tirelessly repairing and coordinating the servicing of all of our patrol equipment prior to the season. As a result of Lachie and James' good work all of our equipment passed the annual gear inspection and was ready for the first weekend of patrol. Lachie and James' ongoing maintenance support throughout the season enabled the club to have sufficient equipment on hand for all patrols and water safety activities over the season. A significant challenge, and well managed !!

As he has done for numerous years, Lloyd Simpson, our First Aid Officer ensured that the first aid room was well organised and stocked throughout the entire season. I was saddened to hear that Lloyd has chosen to step down from this role in the upcoming year but I would like to take this opportunity to thank him for his countless years of outstanding service in this role.

Our seven Anglesea Surf Rescue (ASR) teams delivered 47 days of patrol over the course of the 2018/19 season. Despite our ability to provide beach goers with a safe aquatic environment, this season had its challenges. The most important being our ability to ensure that we had adequate numbers of qualified members patrolling. A decrease in available ASR members required us to move from eight ASR teams to seven.

The reduction in ASR teams resulted in a significant increase in the number of hours each team was required to complete for the season. Captains and their teams were rostered, on average, to complete 42 hours of patrol for the season. This was almost triple our Club's target requirement.

The role of Patrol Captain can often be challenging: managing the beach; monitoring visitors, assessing surf conditions as well as up to 30 members on patrol on a number of occasions.

In spite of these challenges, our ASR Captains kindly volunteered their time to lead and share their knowledge and experience with their teams this season.

During the 2018/19 season the ASR teams were ably lead by the Club's seven patrol Captains:

ASR 3 - Elise Langford ASR 4 - Hugh Moodie
ASR 5 - Mason Schaube ASR 6 - Lachie Eaton

We thank our ASR Captains and their teams who were vital in ensuring that Anglesea met its minimum requirements

with LSV.

As a Rescue Services Team we recognise the need to continue to strengthen our brand. We need to ensure even more members participate on patrols in the coming seasons, in order to grow our lifesaving capability and to more equally share the workload across the Club. We are thankful for those members who patrolled in 2018/19 and are looking forward to seeing them back again during the 2019/20 season, together with as many members who missed out this season. During 2018/19 volunteer patrol teams performed 4 rescues, 30 first aids and 2,308 preventative actions over the season, resulting in a safe aquatic environment being delivered to Anglesea visitors.

Anglesea was again serviced by lifeguards each day over the peak summer period. Lifeguards play a vital role in keeping our beach safe during the week and we thank them for their service as well as the 1 rescue, 34 first aids and 1,042 preventative actions they performed while working at Anglesea and Point Roadknight this summer.

It is a Club requirement for all of our active members to complete 16 hours of patrol each season. This season a number of our active members fulfilled this commitment and we hope to see them return next season. In addition, I would like to take this opportunity to thank those members who went above and beyond their commitment to actively support rescue services this season.

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Whilst I have been a continuous member of this Club since 1983, it has been wonderful to increasingly re-engage over the past few years as our children enter Nippers and to observe the remarkable Nipper, Starfish, Dolphin and youth programs in action. The knowledgeable and overwhelmingly positive leadership of the Nipper program is a great example of volunteerism and community service in developing life skills and hopefully life-long friendships in our children. It is with great pleasure that I report on youth development activities at Anglesea for the 2018/19 season.

The intensive summer period of Nippers, complete with our Art show, Family night and concluding with the Club Championships proceeded this year with excellent weather and great participation rates. Additionally, many young members chose to attend other activities. The year-round Dolphins program, run monthly throughout winter and then weekly from spring, built fitness and surf skills through exposure to the everchanging aquatic environment. We ran a December training weekend with numerous fun and challenging activities, developing our community and friendships for both Nippers and parents alike. After competing in surf carnivals at Bancoora, Mordialloc and Lorne, we then returned to Lorne for the State Titles where challenging surf ultimately resulted in shortening of the carnival on the final day. Anglesea came 6th overall in the point score but the highlight for me was the sense of comradery across our team as Nippers and their parents rallied around their determined clubmates in the final events. The Club coaches and I hope to build on this momentum for the coming season.

Fiona Fitzgerald has provided outstanding leadership during her time as the Big Nipper over the past 3 years. By placing a high value on participation and the development of friendships, she has generated a great sense of community within the junior club. Along with her husband Shem and children Dibdin, Jemima and Chloe, who are always working hard behind the scenes readying gear, leading activities and providing water safety, I wish to wholeheartedly thank Fiona and the entire Fitzgerald clan for their extended and considerable contribution to the Nipper and Dolphin programs. Fiona has nominated herself to coordinate the water safety team for the upcoming season, so will remain heavily involved.

Janet Jones created and has led a ground-breaking Starfish Nipper Program over the past 8 years and is stepping down for next season. As a Club, we wholeheartedly thank you Janet for your vision and passion in pioneering a program that truly celebrates diversity and inclusiveness. You have, along with Naomi Symington, brought joy to so many of our members and we wish you luck in your future endeavours.

There have been some inspiring members I would like to highlight. Training to become the youngest paddler to cross Bass Strait unsupported, Max Mauderer was unfortunately



sidelined with a serious illness this season. However, in a testament to his perseverance and determination, he utilised his enforced downtime to develop his paddling technique and skills, later racing at the Australian titles in the U17 ski where, despite a lack of race practice, he was one of the leading paddlers through the qualifying rounds. On the lead wave in the final with 4 others, he was eventually assigned 5th place following extended deliberations by the judges which is a fantastic result and demonstrates the value of cultivating both opportunity from adversity and a steadfast self-belief.

Hard working and ever-enthusiastic, Dibdin Fitzgerald made the Victorian State Team that travelled to Sydney for the Interstate Championships, and this season he won his second State Ironman Championship. Just as significantly, he was able to utilise his rescue skills to perform a critical rescue on the morning of the junior State Nipper Titles. Verity Duff and Harriet Maskell represented Anglesea at the U15 Leadership Development Camp to advance their leadership, interpersonal and teamwork skills along with 48 youth members from 28 clubs. The camp sought to develop our future leaders and both Verity and Harriet thoroughly enjoyed the experience and we look forward to their insights next season. Well done Max, Dibdin, Verity and Harriet!

Without a clubhouse for next season, we will look to repeat the success of our December Dolphins training weekend at another venue, plus develop further training camp opportunities on the Sunshine Coast. Our Dolphins program runs throughout the year, including winter, and continues to develop fitness and surf skills in a fun and sociable format. This year we have incorporated some Melbourne-based sessions and I would encourage anyone interested to attend – the best way to find information is by subscribing to Anglesea SLSC Surf Sports on Team App.

Finally, I would like to thank the countless parents and other Club members who continue to support our children through participation as age group leaders, BBQ attendees, water safety, social event organisers and in a myriad of other ways. Our programs are enhanced by your efforts and I would challenge everyone to consider how they could contribute for next season. I would also like to thank Jaci Chin-Jewson, Jennie Mauderer and Jen McIntyre who work tirelessly behind the scenes for the benefit of the Club, the Anglesea Supporters Group who funded a number of Nipper activities and equipment, and to Rob O'Brien who managed the youth development role for the 2018/9 season. NIPPERS REPORT

Our Club's program continues to attract great support from parents, with nearly 500 Nippers enrolled to take part in the intensive program, which was condensed down from the usual 10 sessions to 9 due to the fall of the holiday dates this year.

We had a strong turn out of new Age Group Leaders, including some the of younger members of our Club. Managing large groups of kids is not always an easy task for 16 to 20 year olds, as these groups can be incredibly intimidating. However the benefits for the Nippers to have younger (not parent) leaders is so positive and it is also invaluable experience in developing people management and communication skills for these emerging leaders. This engagement of younger leaders is something I would like to see actively encouraged in the future, as a development pathway for them after they have been assisting with water safety support. Other new Age Group Leaders also witnessed an injection of new energy into the program after a changing of the guard over the last few years, which saw a drop off in the number of Leaders.

The Nipper program consisted of an integrated approach combining surf safety and surf sports skills development in each session. The focus continues to be on building confidence, community and capacity within each age group. The Water Safety volunteers were very integral to the program and the team was well led by Matt Keenan, who along with a group of very experienced parents, helped mentor over 100 young Bronze and SRC holders in maintaining effective water safety for the large Nipper group. I can say with complete confidence that this year's Water Safety team were the best we have ever had and they made the program so successful. They also inspire the Nippers to strive to build their skills and confidence in the water, and to one day become the next-generation of Water Safety crew and beyond at the Club.

Thanks to the wonderful Supporters Group we were able to purchase some new equipment for our competition squad, including some transition boards for our under 14 athletes and some fiberglass Nipper boards for smaller athletes. The Supporters Group also hosted our now annual family fun night at the Anglesea Football Club, and again this proved to be a wonderful opportunity for the Nipper community to come together and hopefully feel a stronger connection with the Club. We are always so grateful for the help of the Supporters Group.

It has also been fantastic to see so many connections and friendships develop beyond the beach, with families, trainers and Starfish Nippers arranging catch ups and social activities.

Our Starfish song was again a hit to begin each session in a fun and engaging way, with our Nippers playing their instruments to the beat. During each session, we undertook our own group activities to develop skills and confidence, and on many occasions, we joined with different age groups to take part in flag activities, wade relays, running relays and a water bucket relay.

We had our courageous Starfish Nippers and trainers compete again in the Roo Run this season - running 2.5km is no easy feat! Thanks to the Anglesea Yacht Club and Surf Coast Trail Runners for organising the event and making it inclusive to all of the community.

For the first time, we added a First Aid component to our program, joining with the SRC group to extend those Starfish Nippers who wanted to learn more about emergency treatment. It was terrific to see how much our participants learnt from the experience and a real highlight to see them demonstrate CPR and proudly recap the first steps in First Aid assessment.

During the season, we attempted to hold an Open Day for all Starfish Clubs, families and interested new Nippers and families but unfortunately a heat wave meant the session had to be cancelled and when we postponed it to the Saturday, it didn't suit many families. We did have a Starfish Nipper and his trainers from Hampton LSC come and enjoy our obstacle course and age group activities and I am sure they took back some ideas for their own club.

I'd like to thank Naomi Symington for her support and enthusiasm during the season.

Together with Hampton LSC, we organised the inaugural Starfish Nipper Carnival in February. Hampton LSC initiated the carnival and made it happen thanks to Kerrie Curtis and her team. Naomi and I assisted with running the day but Hampton LSC put in all the work, arranging activities for groups of different abilities, sticker boards for achievements and an awesome medal presentation with medals donated from the Anglesea Uniting Church. In total, 51 Starfish

BEACH SECTION REPORT

It is hard to believe that preparations for the competition season began way back in April last year when planning began for the Anglesea Beach Team to attend the Lifesaving World Championships - Rescue 2018 in Adelaide. Anglesea was very proud to have teams compete in both the Masters and Open Interclub competitions during the November event with some fantastic results. Congratulations to Naomi Symington, Ilona Carson and Sally Cumming who competed in the Masters division. Under the extreme weather conditions, which presented cyclonic winds, the team won the silver medal in the beach relay, Sally winning the beach flags, Ilona making the final of both the beach sprint and beach flags and Naomi winning the silver medal in her beach flags.

The Open Interclub team consisted of Stephanie Larkin, Kate Walker, Marli Wilkinson, Camilla Butler, Marcus Jones and Saxon Beale. Due to the ILS competition rules, both Marli (U19) & Camilla (U17), had to compete in the Open division. The girls did a fantastic job by making the final of the beach relay where they finished 5th and both Marli & Stephanie making the B-final of the beach sprint. In the men's area, Marcus unfortunately had to withdraw due to injury in the semi-final of the beach flags while Saxon made the quarter-final. Marcus also made the semi-final of the beach sprint where he qualified for the 'B' final finishing 2nd, hence 10th overall.

During the 2018/19 season we had a good presence in the beach area at all the local carnivals and were probably the #2 Club behind Altona. But we are still finding it hard to attract new competitors in the U14 & U15 area, so I take this opportunity to invite all current Nippers and SRC members who want to become more involved in the Club through competition—it's great fun for people of all abilities, and you don't have to be Usain Bolt, just give it a try!!

It was a challenging year, at both a Victorian & National level, for beach events in 2018/19 as some unfortunate scheduling resulted in the Victorian & National Track & Field Championships clashing with both the Victorian & Australian Surf Life Saving Championships.

Some of the outstanding achievements during the year were:

- Saxon Beale winning the Bruce Thompson Award as the most successful point-score winner in the beach area during the 2017/18 season.
- Marli Wilkinson & Saxon Beale representing Victoria in the National Interstate Championships, Marli once again competing in the Open age group as a junior competitor which is a testament to her performance in Victoria.
- Stephanie Larkin winning the Victorian 400m Open Women's hurdles championship & qualifying for the National Track & Field Championships.
- Sally Cumming was a finalist in the Masters section of the Victorian Sports Awards.

- Marli Wilkinson winning the Victorian 400m U20 Women's hurdles championship & winning bronze at the National Track & Field Championships and gold in the U20 4x400m relay.
- 10 medals (3 Gold, 3 Silver, 4 Bronze) and 18 finalists at the Victorian Surf Life Saving Championships. Unfortunately, we could not hold onto our title this season as winners of the Open Mixed Beach Relay point-score champions, beaten by Altona on a countback!!
- Having 4 to 5 new competitors regularly attending each carnival during the season.
- The Masters girls winning a silver medal (let's not mention anything about batons) in the beach relay at the Aussies, Sally 3rd in the beach flags & 2nd in the beach sprint, Ilona making the final in both the beach sprint & beach flags (resulting in broken ribs).
- Marcus Jones winning the bronze medal in the Open Men's Beach Flags at the Australian Championships – the best result Anglesea has ever achieved in this event.
- Our boys finishing 4th in the U19 Beach Relay at their very first Aussies with a team made up of 3 U17 competitors. Nick Guiney & Jerard Feneley both making the semi final of the U17 men's beach sprint.

So, you can see from these results it has been a very full year indeed and we have some outstanding members at our Club who we should all be very proud of.

I would like to take this opportunity to make a special mention to Kate Walker, Peter van Miltenburg and John Baldock who all make significant contributions to make this beach team one of the best in Australia and provide an environment that is not only welcoming but the envy of other clubs.

BOAT SECTION REPORT

Following the departure of many Surf Boat section members in 2018, this season started at a low point with the fewest crews for many years. The section mainstays were again the Mens 260+ years Masters crew which competed in both Open and Master's competition. This crew comprising David Warburton, Ian McGain, Richard Holding, Barry White and David Love (Sweep) was arguably the oldest crew competing nationally, with an average age of over 70 years; one which would actually qualify as a 280+ crew (if the category existed)!

Special mention was made at the 2017/18 AGM of Ian McGain's outstanding contribution to the Club's surf boat rowing history. Commencing his competitive career for the Club as a junior boat crew member in 1962, and subsequently as a member of arguably our best Open boat crew, he continues to compete in Open and Master's events. His is clear demonstration that age is no barrier to competing in this sport.

In November 2018, the crew competed at the World Masters in Adelaide (with David Spiteri stepping in), at the Anglesea Carnival in January 2019, the Australian Surf Rowers League (ASRL) Open Carnival also at Anglesea, the Lorne Victorian Surf Rowers League (VSRL) Masters in Feb 2019 at which it earned a Gold medal, the ASRL National Masters at Elouera Beach (NSW) where it gained a Silver medal and the Australian SLSA Titles at Broadbeach, (Qld) where it finished fifth. Our performance at the Aussies was very disappointing as the crew had trained hard and expected a podium finish. Unfortunately, the combination of the notorious Broadbeach/Kurrawa shore break and sand bars, together with a large irregular swell, did not play out in our favour in the first two rounds and it was only the third round which saw us with a clear run with a finish among the leading two or three boats.

The season has been challenging but there is a strong commitment to rebuilding the section and efforts are being made to increase sweeps as well as new boat crew members. Some 'Come & Try' days were held at Pt Roadknight for Club members and interested members of the public to experience surf boat rowing and the thrill of catching waves. Former rowers and new prospects attended and are potential starters for the 2019/20 season. Special focus will however, be directed towards working with other sections of the Club such as Youth and Member Development, to create opportunities for younger members to experience surfboat rowing and become future boat section competitors.

It is also important to note that whilst traditionally, surf boat rowing has been a largely male domain, it was mentioned at this year's Aussies Championships that nearly 50% of crew members currently competing in surf boats are female. This is a remarkable achievement and credit to those girls and female rowers who have taken on what is a tough sport. Therefore, surf boat rowing is equally accessible in the Club to both male and female members. This is important to note in terms of our future development.

We are confident that these initiatives will lead to a reemergence of Anglesea's prominence as a power in surf boat competition into the future.

In conclusion, while this season has certainly not been our greatest, the future is bright and we must now direct our efforts to rebuilding the section. I would also take this opportunity to thank our sweep David Love, for his considerable time commitment to training and competition throughout the season and his patience in dealing with a collection of 'grumpy old men'. A job well done and many great waves conquered!

They are truly inspiring the next generation of Anglesea competitors, and the whole competition section learns so much from their wealth of experience and commitment to Surf Sports.

The R&R section provided three officials for Aussies. Christine Cardwell and Karen Dale for Aussies Youths and Warren Clarke and Karen Dale for Aussies Opens. The Team Manager position was vacant last year, but this was taken up by Sai Dale, who was able to pull everything together and managed the team.

It is also important to note that Warren Clarke and Emma Moore have also been sharing their knowledge and expertise with growing R&R Clubs, including Bonbeach, Williamstown and Altona. There is a growing groundswell, that if support is given to these clubs who are interested, the R&R event will continue to prosper.

The Surf'n'Turf category, which combines an entrant's time in the 1.2km swim with their time in the 8km RooRun held by the Anglesea Motor Yacht Club the previous evening was again held, proving swimmers can run (or is that runners can swim?). To this end the Club is indebted to the following members for their assistance in proactively, positively and professionally training Anglesea members in 2019; Mike Martin, Lachie Eaton, Freddie Graham, Sean McVernon, Andrew (Doc) Rechtman, Sophie Elam, Ed McKay, Tom Cullen, Peter King, Ingilby Dickson and Derek Stott.

For many in the Club, 2018 was a back to the future moment with the Bronze Camp being based entirely at the Clubhouse for the first time since the early 2000's. Anglesea was also proactive in implementing a 'fast track' approach to Bronze training that recognised the significant overlap between the SRC qualification and the Bronze Medallion. Thus building upon this prior learning enabled us to run a condensed program with the feedback from Assessors indicating that the reduced length of the course had not compromised outcomes in anyway. There was a strong camaraderie between both the candidates and the training team which was fantastic to see, and most importantly, a large number of newly qualified members being actively involved in patrols in the post Christmas period.

The SRC program continues to provide a fantastic experience for those members transitioning from Nippers to cadets. Ingilby, Derek and their team of skilled helpers do a wonderful job in managing and instructing this group and inducting them into all things 'lifesaving'. It is important that I take this opportunity to thank Noel Langford for his work in this area over many years. Unfortunately work commitments prevented Noel from participating in this season, but his efforts in developing a robust program have been significant.

Alongside these base awards we have had a great many members attaining advanced qualifications in first aid and IRB skills. Moreover, many members have also attained their Training Officer Certificate, a qualification that is vital to ability of the Club to train members in the future.

Planning for the 2019/2020 season is well underway and we are looking to work more closely with the Youth Development section and to establish an U15 program that will bridge the gap between SRC and Bronze. We are also looking to simplify the pathway through the Club and to make it easier for members to identify when and where they can be involved.

BUILDING REDEVELOPMENT

It took awhile but we got there, as the past 12 months saw us finally get to the point where this project became a reality.

In last years report we stated "Ideally we would like to commence works in early 2019 but that is totally dependent of funding. The club is budgeting \$5 million and that is consistent with the costs of similar surf club redevelopments around the state."

We then had a bit of a shock when the Quantity Surveyors assessed the design and provided an estimate in excess of \$5m and as everyone knows, and were quick to tell us, the real cost will be at least 10% higher! It was with a fair amount of trepidation that we then went to market to ensure we knew the real cost and were pleased to get four quotations that were at or below the QS estimate, with some just below the \$5m mark.

A funding strategy was then put in place that would have allowed us to commence works around May/June 2019 even if we did not receive additional government funding, although this would have entailed a phased development over a longer timeframe. Then in early March we were advised that our application for \$1m under the Federal Government's Building Better Regions Fund had been successful. This then allowed us to enter into contract negotiations with the preferred contractor, with a view to works starting during the winter.

Importantly for the protection of member's interests our Project Governance Group has continued to oversee these processes to ensure process transparency is observed and maintained, that we conform to the requirements attached to grant funding that has been received and that we comply with all relevant legal obligations.

To farewell the old clubhouse a very successful Farewell Party was held on Easter Sunday with close to 300 members past and present attending. It was great to see some faces who had travelled from interstate to attend the day and clearly displayed the lifelong memories and friendships the clubhouse and Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club have helped to create. With eight Past Presidents in attendance, guests were entertained with stories of times gone by and it was also fantastic to have local musician Tristan Ross in attendance entertaining the guests.

At the time of writing the club has raised just over \$5m to cover the project costs. This includes two Federal Government grants of \$0.5m and \$1m that were achieved on the basis of competitive grant applications and, thanks to the tireless efforts of our Fundraising Chair, Ingilby Dickson, over \$1.75m in donations and pledges from members and supporters.

The works will clearly impact on Club operations during next season but the relevant Directors are all working hard to deliver the normal range of activities.





1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The directors have determined that the company is not a reporting entity and accordingly, this financial report is a special purpose report prepared for the sole purpose of distributing a financial report to members and must not be used for any other purpose. The directors have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and under the historical cost convention, except for certain assets, which, as noted, have been written down to fair value as a result of impairment. Unless otherwise stated, the accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the prior year.

The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment* Act 1997.

Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

inventories acquired at no cost or for nominal consideration are measured at the current replacement cost as at the date of acquisition.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is initially recorded at the cost of acquisition or fair value less, if applicable, any accumulated deprecation and minament because. But and evolution that had been contributed at no cost, of for nonlimations, is valued and recognised at the fairvalue of the assets and equipment that has been contributed at no case, or for nonlimations, is valued and recognised at the fairvalue of the assets the date it is acquired. The plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure that the carrying amount is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the utilisation of the assets and the subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in estimating recoverable amounts.

Freehold land and buildings are measured at their fair value, based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by independent external valuers, less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount of land and buildings arising on revaluation are credited in equity to a revaluation surplus. Decreases against privous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves in equity. All other decreases are charged to profit of loss.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is offset against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables, including distributions receivable, are recognised at the nominal transaction value without taking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company that remain unpaid at 30 April 2018. Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. They are subject to normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

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Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers. Revenue from the rendering of services is recognised upon the delivery of the services to customers. Revenue from commissions is recognised upon delivery of services to customers. Revenue from interest is recognised using the effective interest rate method. Revenue from dividends is recognised when the entity has a right to receive the dividend.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Goods and Services Tax

Transactions are recognised net of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when the entity receives the grant, when it is probable that the entity will receive the economic benefits of the grant and the amount can be reliably measured.

If the grant has conditions attached which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the grant, the recognition of the revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied. Where the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value back to the grant contributor, the transaction is considered a reciprocal transaction and the revenue is recognised as a liability in the balance sheet until the required service has been completed, otherwise the income is recognised on receipt.

Anglesea Surf Life Saving Club Inc receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for a morninal or zero value. These seases are recognised at their fair value on the date of acquisition in the balance sheet, with an equivalent amount of income recognised in the income statement.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Government Grants



1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The trustees of the Foundation have prepared the financial statements of the Foundation on the basis that the Foundation is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. These financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of beneficiaries, the information needs of stakeholders and for the basis of preparation of the Ancillary Fund Return.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the trustees have determined are appropriate to meet the purposes of preparation. Such accounting policies are consistent with the previous period unless stated of therwise.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and under the historical cost convention, except for certain assets, which, as noted, have been written down to fair value as a result of impairment. Unless otherwise stated, the accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the prior year.

The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables and other receivables, including distributions receivable, are recognised at the nominal transaction value withouttaking into account the time value of money. If required a provision for doubtful debt has been created.

Financial Assets

Investments held are originally recognised at cost, which includes transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at fair value with its equivalent to their market bid price at the end of the reporting period. Movements in fair value are recognised through an equity reserve.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company that remain unpaid at 30 April 2016. Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. They are subject to normal credit terms and do not bear interest.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation resulting from past events, for which it is probable that there will be an outflow of economic benefits and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured using the best estimate available of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.


Revenue Recognition

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
