ASLSC STRATEGIC PLAN 2020-25 PROJECT

The 2015-20 Strategic Plan has played a pivotal role in guiding the allocation of resources towards the club's operations, services and facilities over the past five years.

Underpinning the plan is our vision "to be recognised as a progressive and welcoming club that provides the community with a safe aquatic environment and excellence in surf lifesaving services and activities."

It is now time to commence work on a new strategic planning document, which will guide us into the new era for our club. With the building redevelopment now confirmed, the timing is perfect to re-imagine what the club will look like, and how it will continue to remain relevant in a rapidly changing environment. We want to ensure that we are delivering services, facilities and programs that maximise participation and engagement, and foster strong community connections.

We have engaged The Geelong Consulting Group to assist in leading the development of the Strategic Plan 2020-25. The project also involves the development of a business plan to be implemented in the first three years (Business Plan 20-23).

Member and broader community consultation will be critical to this project. Different sections of the club membership will be invited to provide input as the project progresses.

There will be open forums conducted on the following dates in Melbourne and Anglesea. These are opportunities for all members to be engaged in the development of our strategy.

I was incredibly proud to see Anglesea so well represented at the state nipper championships at Lorne.

Although the carnival was ultimately cut short due to easterly winds generating larger than expected surf and strong currents, Anglesea competitors appeared to thrive in these conditions.

For me, this validated our winter and summer Dolphins programs which intentionally exposed our junior competitors to a wide variety of conditions, developed critical surf skills and built essential fitness. For this I would sincerely like to thank our coaches Jamo Porter, Ivor Morgan, Fiona Fitzgerald, Matt Taylor, Naantali Marshall and Matt and Naomi Symington.

Developing confidence, self-belief, friendships and club spirit remain the priority of our junior program – with high attendances and great camaraderie at our early Dolphins sessions already underway this winter, I am hopeful we will develop a critical mass of junior competitors and enthusiastic parents that can continue this encouraging trend. Life Saving Victoria have already announced that the 2020 state championships will be held over 2.5 days on the Labour Day long weekend and we have held 30 camping spots at the Shipwreck Bay Holiday Park.

The 2019/20 season will rapidly be upon us, and with the lack of a clubhouse and some new people in key positions within the youth area, planning is well underway. We hope to deliver a different but ultimately highly successful nipper and youth program with some key changes that, amongst other things, aim to foster the transition of our junior members into the senior club. 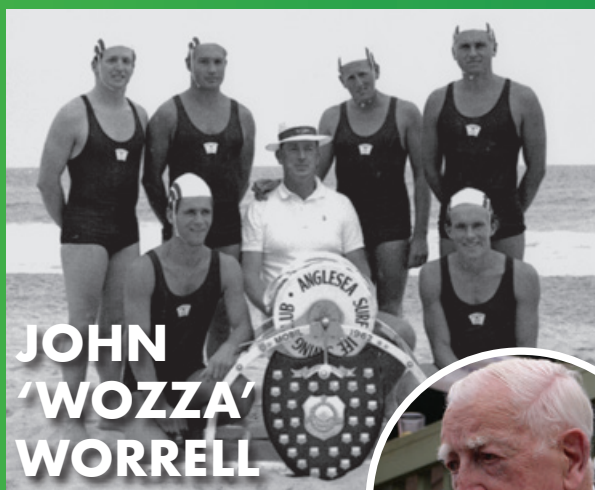

JOHN 'WOZZA' WORRELL

THE SURF LIFE SAVING FAMILY ARE IN MOURNING AFTER THE RECENT PASSING OF JOHN 'WOZZA' WORRELL, A TRUE LEGEND.

A much admired competitor, coach and educator as well as administrator whose accomplishments are acknowledged Australia wide and internationally.

He joined Brighton Life Saving Club in 1942, gaining his bronze medallion and then an award of merit. He was elected Life Member Brighton LSC – 1950 (which in this period was an extraordinary achievement for a 22 year old).

John Worrell and the Brighton Rescue & Resuscitation team gained their Surf Life Saving Bronze Medallion in 1947 at Torquay SLSC.

On 2 January 1952 the Anglesea community called a meeting to discuss forming a new lifesaving club at

Anglesea after a rescue was completed by June Baker and two others and this was the start of John's journey as a foundation member of Anglesea SLSC.

John was inducted to the Anglesea SLSC 'Hall of Fame' in 2012 as coach of Anglesea and presented as a 'Legend'. John was highly regarded with excellence as manager, mentor, coach/educator, planner and innovator from club to international level. John was respected as a man who had the ability to rally support to achieve the vision of 'excellence in lifesaving' achieving;

- Anglesea SLSC Life Member 1964
- Surf Life Saving Victoria – 'Life Member' 1972
- Surf Life Saving Australia – 'Life Member' 1977
- In 1978 John was awarded Life Governor of the Anglesea Community Bush Nursing Centre.
- Australian Honours – Federation Sports Award 2001
- Australian Honours – Order of Australia 2017 contributions to lifesaving

John served as a member, committee member and Vice President of the Anglesea Golf Club. John developed a relationship between Anglesea SLSC and the Anglesea Golf Club where the greens were donated one day of the year for the surf club to run a charity fundraiser. The Anglesea SLSC golf day has generated thousands of dollars for the club since the project's inception.

John Worrell was an extraordinary man with a great skill of communicating with lifesavers of all ages and emergency service organisations. He had a unique ability to gain people onside for a common cause whether it be lifesaving patrols with a high level of excellence or fundraising for the community.



The second running of the Ding Alley Pro was a great success with over 25 competitors and even more spectators coming down for some great entertainment for Easter Saturday.

While the waves didn't quite turn it on for us, the competitors certainly did with head stands, flips, riding waves backwards, boards backwards and more, giving the crowd something to marvel at.

With a large amount of creativity, the judges were under some pressure and as the competition progressed it was clear that the final was going to be close. Isaak Newcombe returned to the final after winning the competition last year. Unfortunately for Isaak, back to back wasn't to occur

with Will Solly taking out the Men's competition and Sophie Elam taking out the Women's competition, being the female to progress furthest just ahead of Nai Symington.

Following the event, a presentation of the Ding Alley Pro Trophy occurred at the Lower Clubhouse with a BBQ put on for competitors, spectators, and the Dolphins. Thanks to Lachlan Appleby for organising a great event and we can't wait for next year's running of the Ding Alley Pro on Easter Saturday.

We have tweaked, updated and adjusted our program for the coming season and will work closely with Rescue Services to develop an integrated program that is a blend of formal training and patrol /lifesaving scenarios and simulations.

Candidates

Registrations will open on July 1 2019 for existing members who completed their SRC qualification in the 2017/2018 season. There will be a members only application period after which and dependent upon numbers we will open up the opportunity to register to new members.

To assist us with out planning it is vital that all existing members sign up in the nominated time period.

Advanced Award Training

REDEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Past and present members gave the old clubhouse a great send off on Easter Sunday and to add to the excitement some significant donations that day pushed our fundraising over the \$5m mark!

Shortly after most of the transition tasks were completed including:

- Relocating the office, shop stock and some rescue gear to the gym area;
- Relocating much of the rescue and training gear to the off-site storage;
- Successfully removing the 1960s Robert Ingpen AM mural from the office walls. It was removed in two pieces and is now in storage. Once we get the building underway we will look at options for restoring and displaying the mural.

After receiving the \$1m Building Better Regions Fund grant in early March we had set an initial target of handing over to the builder on 6 May. Reality then set in when we came to appreciate the raft of further permits and approvals that are required to get things moving.

At the moment our project managers the PDS Group along with Michael Carr Architects, the preferred contractor FourSq and various other consultants are continuing to progress the project. At the time of writing these tasks are all at later stages of progression and include:

- Undertaking a value management assessment to see where cost savings may be made;
- Finalisation of the detailed plans;
- Seeking permits requiring approval from GORCC,

Surf Coast Shire or the Department of Environment, Water, Land & Planning;

- Other pre-tasks identified by the Building Surveyors;
- Contract finalisation and establishing our insurance requirements

At this point we are not keen to nominate a specific date for signing the contract and starting on site, as there are too many variables. That said we are hoping to close out the contract by early June with commencement hoped in mid-late June.

As we reach this important milestone it’s appropriate to acknowledge the work of the club’s Redevelopment Committee including:

- Ingilby Dickson who has done an outstanding job in raising over \$1.75m to support the grant funding we have received;
- Chris Porter who has developed and overseen the transition process and somehow managed to get the mural safely removed;
- Graeme Weber who has been a tireless supporter of the redevelopment over many years;
- Noel Langford and Chris Foley who have overseen process governance; and
- Tom Cullen who, since becoming president, has ensured that the project has had the support it required.
